

PHILIPINOS QUIET, SAYS GEN. ALLEN

Former Chief of Constabulary Thinks Islands Are Pacified.

Anxious to Return to America to Join Family.

LEXINGTON, Va., June 24.—Brig. Gen. Henry T. Allen, chief of the Philippine constabulary, spent a few hours en route to Georgetown, Ky., from Washington, where he had been to present his personal thanks to the officials of the War Department for transferring him from the Philippine constabulary, which General Allen organized, to the command of the soldiers at Yellowstone Park.

THREE ARE DROWNED NEAR WASHINGTON

While in Bathing in the Eastern Branch, Just back of the Reform School, in Bladensburg road, about 4 o'clock, Harry E. Owens, twenty-four years of age, of Langdon, D. C., was seized with cramps, and sank.

Before anyone could reach him he had gone to the bottom, and it is believed the body was carried down stream. The harbor police fringed the channel for the body unsuccessfully.

Falling asleep while fishing from the wharf at the Washington Barracks shortly before 3 o'clock yesterday morning, Richard Page, nineteen years old, of 41 Houton court southwest, rolled off the wharf and was drowned. The body was caught with a grappling hook under the wharf by Charles Gross, of 22 Clark's court southwest, and Paul Underwood, of 23 McLean avenue southwest, about 11 o'clock.

Employers Charge Unions With Building Decrease Of Forty-six Per Cent

Letter Sent Out Today Tells of Construction Cost Increase, Labor Market Monopoly, and Fewer Apprentices.

That 46 per cent less building is in progress in Washington today than a year ago, and that this enormous decrease is directly chargeable to the decreased cost of building construction is the tenor of a letter which is being sent out today by the Employers' Association of the Building Trades, in which the employers' side in the existing troubles with the union men is set forth.

Number of Apprentices Less.

"The number of apprentices allowed to learn a trade has been steadily decreased until there is a real scarcity of labor; in one trade the union has closed its books entirely and will not receive new members; the policy of restriction of output has also been followed until the workman does less than half the work in a day than was the regular average eight or ten years ago," says the letter.

In defense of the Employers' Association's recent action in shutting down all work being done by plasterers, metal-lathers, tile-layers, galvanized and ornamental iron workers, and hoisting engineers, the letter says:

Secured Non-Union Men.

"Many of the plumbing shops in the city secured non-union men. The other building trades unions finally took the matter up and demanded of the Master Builders' Association that the master plumbers be compelled to discharge their non-union men and employ union men in spite of the decision of the arbitrator. A second arbitration was had, and it was again decided that the master plumbers might employ non-union men if they pleased. Thereupon, in violation of this second award, the Building Trades' Alliance called a strike on several jobs of plasterers, galvanized iron workers, and tile setters, the purpose being to compel the employment of union plumbers on these jobs, and then to take up other jobs in succession, until all the non-union plumbers in the city had been forced out.

Arbitration of Oyster.

"Before taking action to meet this movement, the Employers' Association submitted to a still third arbitration, to which the Building Trades' Alliance was a party, and Capt. James F. Oyster was chosen as the arbitrator. After

She was knocked down by the tail of one and was bitten on the leg before she could be taken out. Her legs dangled above the open mouths of the alligators. Those nearest her snapped at her several times. Her slipper was torn off and one leg lacerated badly.

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ALVA ADEE BACK, CYCLE TRIP OVER

Chief Clerk Carr Was in Charge Saturday Afternoon.

Alva A. Adee, Second Assistant Secretary of State, returned to his office this morning and took up the responsibility of the administration of this Government's foreign affairs. Mr. Adee returned to Washington yesterday from his annual two months' "bicycle vacation" in Europe, during which he traveled nearly 2,000 miles awhirl through northern France and eastern Germany.

Upon the return of Mr. Adee to his office it developed that Wilbur J. Carr, chief clerk of the State Department and superintendent of the general consular service, had unconsciously occupied a seat "on the lid" of the department Saturday afternoon. This was the first time in many years that the Secretary of State and all three of his assistants were absent at the same time, although a similar situation was narrowly escaped on April 27 because of the Jamestown Exposition. At that time, Mr. Adee had just sailed for Europe, the Assistant Secretary had gone to the opening of the exposition, and Mr. Wilson, the Third Assistant, was escorting the diplomatic party to the exposition. Mr. Root left suddenly for Clinton, N. Y., to visit his sick brother, and Mr. Wilson hurried back from Jamestown to take his seat "on the lid."

Last Friday, Secretary Root went to his country home at Clinton to spend the summer. Mr. Wilson left that night for New Haven, and Mr. Bacon left Saturday at noon for New Haven, to attend the regatta this week. Mr. Adee had not yet returned home, so the chief clerk was the responsible official of the department, although he was not called upon to act as Secretary.
