

LOW NECK DRESSES ORDERED BY KAISER

Wilhelm Issues Edict Commanding Elaborate Decollete.

Kaiserin Declared Responsible for Lack of Brilliance in Costumes.

BERLIN, July 12.—By the Kaiser's order all women attending the Royal Opera House must appear in decollete gowns, as at Covent Garden, London.

These are perhaps less like society women as known in New York and London than the upper class women of any European capital.

The Kaiserin has been responsible for a good deal of the dowdiness of the women of Berlin.

PLAN TO LYNCH COLORED DOCTOR

May Storm Jail Tonight for Negro Charged With Malpractice.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., July 13.—Authorities of the Montgomery county jail are exercising extra precautions this morning, as they did all night, to defend the jail against an imminent attempt to release and lynch Frank Caffey, a colored doctor, who is charged with malpractice on white women.

Caffey was arrested Thursday as the result of a grand jury investigation. The immediate charge against him was the performance of illegal operations. It has been determined that many reputable white women submitted to the negro doctor's knife.

The entire State is now aroused, and while the scandal growing out of the disclosure will be enormous, this fact seems lost sight of in the mad demand for the negro's life.

Reputable business and professional men, among the latter the city's most prominent doctors, declare Caffey should be lynched. The jail authorities have been informed that the negro doctor will be made tonight. Caffey may be lynched in a pine thicket on the Pickett Springs trolley line.

ALLEGED SLAYER CAPTURED TODAY NEAR ATLANTA

BRISTOL, Tenn., July 13.—Roy Hale, alias Harry Hale, who has been wanted since last December on a charge of the murder of S. J. A. Davis, has been captured at Fort McPherson, near Atlanta, where he has been serving as a sergeant in the Seventeenth U. S. Infantry.

He is a brother of "Ack" Hale, who is in jail here on a charge of the murder of killing his sweetheart, Miss Lillie Davis, who was a sister of his brother's alleged victim.

Many who believe in "Ack" Hale's guilt attribute a desire to prevent her from testifying against his brother as one of his strongest motives. The girl's evidence, many think, would have sent Roy Hale to the gallows.

When Anna Robinson first appeared on the American stage some years ago she did not attract particular attention. She was a member of Charles Frohman's companies and was later taken into the Hovt companies to succeed Caroline Mitchell Hoyt in "A Temperance Town" and other of that author's farces.

In the same company with Miss Robinson was an actor of less than ordinary ability. He was on the program as James Erskine. But he was known in London, for in his time he had been a central and illustrious figure of an old family.

Erskine went back to England. In the meantime, Anna Robinson had manifestly made a lucky strike of some description, for she had retired from the stage, and was living in luxurious style. Her admirers were legion, and numbered many members of the English nobility.
