

THANK OFFERING IS CHIEF TOPIC OF CONVENTION

Episcopal Missionary Work Put on Sound Basis by Contributions.

Washington Minister Makes Address On Change of Canon.

RICHMOND, Va., Oct. 10.—The one topic of the convention this morning is the men's thank offering of \$775,213.12, which, with the Woman's Auxiliary tribute, gives the "million for missions" that will put the missionary work on a permanent and successful foundation.

Routine business has occupied the attention of the house of deputies all morning. This is liable to be one of the dull days of the convention, after the fireworks of yesterday. It is but a half-session, and those with important motions to propose are postponing their consideration until tomorrow.

The rector of St. John's Church has invited the general convention to attend a historical service in St. John's Church on Saturday afternoon, October 12.

Washingtonian Makes Address. In the consideration of the canon on appeals, the Rev. Alfred Harding, of Washington, spoke of the question and noted that the words "ecclesiastical authority" be substituted for the bishop.

The memorial of Georgia, asking for a uniform parochial report and a thorough definition of the word "communicant," was recommended by the committee on the state of the church.

Would Prevent Remarriage. A resolution offered by Bishop Doane, of Albany, before the house of bishops of the general Episcopal convention yesterday afternoon, the purport of which was to deny marriage to any divorced person, was rejected by the house after a long discussion.

Rejection of the resolution followed the report of a special committee on marriage and divorce appointed to render an opinion in the matter. The committee recommended that the resolution be rejected, and their recommendation was accepted.

The bishop of Albany was the author of the resolution adopted at the Boston convention in 1904, which limited the marriage of divorced persons to the innocent party.

FIGHT FOR SENATE OPENS; GOV. BROWN WITHDRAWS. BALTIMORE, Oct. 10.—Six candidates for the long term in the United States Senate have filed notice of their intention to enter the primaries with the Democratic State central committee.

Former Gov. Frank Brown filed a notice of his candidacy and then withdrew it, declaring the whole proceeding was nothing but a joke. His withdrawal gives the support of the city delegation to former Gov. John Walter Smith.

Other candidates are Gov. Edwin Warfield, Congressman J. Fred C. Talbot, former Congressman Joshua W. Miles, former Attorney General John P. Fox, and Gen. Joseph B. Scott.

HIS JOB MADE PERMANENT. Thomas H. Veney was today transferred from the temporary roll as messenger in the office of the Engineer of Highways to the annual roll, to fill a vacancy made by the resignation of Julien P. Armistead.

John Branson, a laborer in the same department, has been appointed fireman in place of S. Richardson.

DR. BLACKFORD MUCH BETTER; TO LEAVE HOSPITAL SHORTLY

Encouraging reports have been received from Richmond concerning the condition of Dr. L. M. Blackford, principal of the Episcopal High School of Alexandria, who was run over yesterday by an automobile.

He rallied, however, and responded so readily to treatment that he will probably be taken to Alexandria in a day or two. Dr. Blackford was conspicuous in the sessions of the Episcopal Convention in Richmond, and when news of the accident reached the houses of deputies that body suspended its sessions.

Mrs. Blackford went to Richmond yesterday, immediately after receiving news of the accident to her husband. When Dr. Blackford was admitted to the hospital it was thought that he had slight chance of recovery, because of the character of his injuries and his age.

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Mrs. George Haas, who attempted to leap into the Eastern Branch, from the Anacostia bridge, last night, with out her latent mind, was located today, and it is feared that she may again try to take her life.

Mrs. Haas was seen to be acting queerly by Officer Ready, and when taken to the station in Anacostia, a letter telling of her intention to end her life, was discovered on her person.

An officer took the woman to her home, at 1255 Eleventh street southeast, and her three sons, John Thomas, Melvin, and Willie, aged thirteen, nine and five years, respectively, were taken to the industrial home.

At 125 Eleventh street, where the woman has a room on the third floor of the building, one of the other occupants said this morning that shortly after being brought home by a policeman, Mrs. Haas went out again, and, as has not since been seen.

Mrs. Thomas, the mother of the woman, said this morning that she had no idea that her daughter would try to commit suicide, although she had often threatened to do so. So far, the police have not been asked to look for the woman.

REAR ADMIRAL URIEL SEBRE, who was recently relieved of the duties as secretary of the Lighthouse Board in this city, to take command of the special service squadron, has hoisted his flag on the Tennessee, at Norfolk, and is having the two big armored cruisers, the Tennessee and Washington, put in readiness for the journey to the Pacific, which will begin next Saturday.

The vessels are now coaling, and the provision supply, which was put aboard at the Norfolk Navy Yard several days ago, will be added to today and tomorrow.

It is announced at the Navy Department that Admiral Sebre will be unaccompanied by a set sailing schedule, and he is expected to take three months to complete the journey to San Francisco. Upon arrival at Magdalena Bay, lower California, the squadron will go through the regular winter maneuvers.

The squadron will not round the Horn, as has been frequently reported, but will take the Straits of Magellan route, by which the Atlantic battleship fleet will also enter the Pacific. Of all the warships of the American navy that have been in both oceans, only one, the Tacoma, has ever been around the Horn.

BIRTHMARKS EFFECED BY RADIUM TREATMENT

PARIS, Oct. 10.—Two of the foremost physicians of Paris, Drs. Wickham and Degrais, have created a sensation at the Academy of Medicine by a report on their discovery of a method of removing birthmarks by the action of radium. Such marks have hitherto been believed to be indelible. The new method has proved equally successful in the case of adults and children.

The marks are effaced by the simple application of a plane surface covered with varnish containing radium. The action is regulated by length and frequency of the applications. A series of watercolors exhibited at the Academy showed the gradual disappearance of birthmarks subjected to the treatment until not the slightest trace of the disfigurement remained. The applications are absolutely painless. The treatment may be applied to an infant during sleep.

The doctors add that the birthmarks most easily cured are those which are most highly colored.
