SENOR ZAVALIA TRANSFERRED TO PARIS LEGATION

Senor Don Carlos E. Zavalla, secretary of the Argentine legation at Washington, has, according to cable dispatches from Mexico, been transferred to the Argentine legation at Paris.

Senor Zavalla was appointed to duty at the legation here several years, coming to Washington early in 1904. He first served as secretary of the legation under Senor Don Martin Garcia Mefrou, the minister from Argentina at that time.

Previous to the arrival of Senor Portela, the present minister, Senor Zavalla acted as charge d'affaires of the legation.

Senor Zavalla formerly lived at Rauschers', but at the time of his departure for his own country, some time in June, he occupied apartments in the Diplomatic Corps in Washington, where he was one of the most popular young bachelors in the service.

Senor Don P. Costa will succeed Senor Zavalla, and is expected to arrive in this country shortly.
