Baroness Rosen is taking her daughter over to be formally presented to society first in the court of her native land. Upon her return to Washington next October she will make her debut here.

Going first to Italy, they will travel extensively through southern Europe until January, when they will go to St. Petersburg for the season there.

The Baroness Elizabeth has been most carefully reared, and has only lately made her appearance in public, even at the theaters. At nineteen she speaks four languages fluently and is eminently fitted for the life of the Diplomatic Corps. She is a dainty, attractive young woman, with fluffy blonde hair and a winning personality. It is expected that she will be quite an important factor of Washington society next winter.

The departure of the Baroness Rosen will leave the Russian embassy without its hospitable hostess, and the embassy on I street will not be the scene of many large entertainments this winter.
