

All Italy Shocked By a Royal Scandal

Duchess d'Aosta Flees to Egypt Despite Entreaties.

Duke Entertained Too Many Young Girls, It Is Said.

ROME, Dec. 6.—Because the Duke d'Aosta, the King's cousin, persisted in entertaining young girls in the royal villa at Capo di Monte, a suburb of Naples, the Duchess d'Aosta has fled to Cairo, Egypt, and all Italy is shocked by the ensuing scandal.

Aristocratic Italy is now wondering if the King will exile the duke since the duchess has gone. The young girls are said to have been introduced to the duke by women high in Naples aristocracy. It is also said that the duke made desperate efforts to dissuade the duchess from leaving, but without avail.

FIVE VICE ADMIRALS ASKED BY BROWNSON

Rear Admiral Willard H. Brownson, chief of the Bureau of Navigation, in his annual report to the Secretary of the Navy, recommends the reorganization of the grade of vice admiral in the American Navy, which was abolished by act of Congress, be re-established. He sets forth that Rear Admiral Evans, commanding the combined fleet, which will go to the Pacific, should be a vice admiral. In no other country in the world, he says, is such a large command placed in the hands of a rear admiral. The bureau recommends the appointment of five vice admirals. It is set forth in the report that there is still a considerable shortage in the commissioned personnel of the Navy, due to the fact that too big ships have been commissioned during the year. Care is being taken to eliminate foreign-born officers from the Navy, and attention is called to the fact that the enlisted force is nearly 4,000 short of the full quota.

ALDRICH SEES BANKERS ABOUT CURRENCY BILL

Senator Aldrich, chairman of the Finance Committee, is in New York in conference with bankers and financiers over the money situation, the need for currency legislation, and the kind of legislation that is advisable. He is expected to remain there the rest of the week.

EIGHTH STREET DWELLING IS SOLD BY OWEN & SON

The two-story basement brick dwelling at 24 Eighth street northeast was sold by Thomas J. Owen & Son, auctioneers, for the trustees, John E. Herrell and Aaron S. Caywood, to Mary and Kate Noyes. The price obtained under the hammer was \$3,250.

TRAGEDY IN DANCE THAT CHARMED GIRL

BOSTON, Dec. 6.—Because she refused to give up dancing, pretty Della Georgogin lies dangerously wounded at the Massachusetts General Hospital today, while the husband she disobeyed is dead, a suicide. Thanksgiving night Joseph Georgogin pleaded with Della on the way home from a dance to give up the pleasure, because it made him desperately jealous, and when she refused, waved a revolver and threatened to kill her. After that she declined to live with him.

Early today Joseph called at the house where his wife was staying and begged her to come back to him. "Not unless you let me go to dances," was her reply. Joseph's answer was to rush wildly from the house and return in a few minutes with a pistol. First he fired a bullet into his wife's body, then, believing her dead, he ran into the house a friend next door, where he blew out his own brains.

ASK MEMORIAL BRIDGE ACROSS THE POTOMAC

Among District bills introduced in the Senate is one by Senator Daniel of Virginia for a memorial bridge across the Potomac from the old Naval Observatory grounds to Arlington. The bill carries \$4,000,000, authorization for construction of the bridge, and \$500,000 appropriation for immediate use.

DEBATE ON FINANCE WILL BEGIN SHORTLY

Among the important matters which the Senate is expected to take up early next week are the Clay and Culberson resolutions, calling on the Secretary of the Treasury for information respecting public deposits and also the Panama Canal bond allotments and allotments of the 3 per cent certificates of indebtedness.

These resolutions went over again yesterday afternoon, owing to the absence of Senator Aldrich, chairman of the Finance Committee. It is thought that the discussion of the resolutions, in which the Democrats are likely to say some pretty sharp things at the expense of Mr. Cortis, will open up debate on the general financial situation and the need for currency legislation, though the Republicans will avoid this if possible.

NORTHWEST PROPERTIES SOLD FOR AN INVESTMENT

Stone & Fairfax have sold to a client from Pennsylvania two pieces of property in the northwest for investment. One of the properties is located at 1762 Willard street northwest and the other at 1721 Fourth street, both valued at \$10,500. These properties are modern and under rental.

Senator Frye of Maine was re-elected as president pro tempore of the Senate. He has held this place continuously since February 7, 1898. Senator Culberson dominated Senator Daniel for this office on behalf of the minority. The first bill of the session was passed, a measure proposed by Mr. Whyte of Maryland, changing the form of issuing public documents.

RENEW PENSION BILL FOR U. S. LIFE-SAVERS

Senator Frye has introduced once more the bill to increase the efficiency of the life-saving service. For years the life-saving service has been pouncing at the gates of the Capitol and insisting on having something like a square deal from the Government. One session after another has refused to do anything, but this session, the advocates of legislation are going to make a strong effort to get something done and hope to succeed.

BANK REMOVES CASHIER: IRREGULARITIES SUSPECTED

PENSACOLA, Fla., Dec. 6.—Cashier J. C. Schudamore, of the Pensacola Bank and Trust Company, has been removed from office by the directors owing to the discovery of alleged irregularities in his accounts. Bank examiners are now here making a thorough examination, but the extent of the shortage has not yet been disclosed. President Bass, of the trust company, stated that whatever shortage exists is not so large but that it will be covered by the indemnity fund of the cashier.

Leslie Carter Sale Of All Furniture Permitted by Court

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—All of Mrs. Leslie Carter-Payne's handsome furniture is to be turned into Christmas presents for more solvent Americans. Yesterday Assemblyman Ezra Prentice, receiver in bankruptcy of the actress, obtained permission of Federal Judge Hough to hold the auction sale at Mrs. Payne's residence, 115 East Nineteenth street.

SWIFT MANSION ROBBED WHILE OCCUPANTS SLEEP

CHICAGO, Dec. 6.—Burglars broke into the mansion of Herbert L. Swift, 450 Michigan avenue, yesterday and rifled the house of jewels, family plate, and other valuables, the price of which has not yet been estimated. Police of the entire South Side have been detailed to search for the robbers, but so far they have met with no success. As it was early in the morning, Mr. Swift, his wife, and the servants were asleep on the upper floors.

UNION-MADE POTATOES ON MARKET IN CHICAGO


