Safety of Life on Roads Will Be Insured by Law

Representative Esch Has Bill for Investigation of All Wrecks, While Experiments With Signaling Devices Will Start Soon.

The waste of human life on American railroads vastly exceeds that of any other important country in the world. For several years the figures have been staggering humanity and worrying Congress, but how to remedy conditions has not been apparent.

It is now believed that within the next five years legislation already passed or certain to pass at the present or the next session of Congress, will bring pretty effectual remedy.

Representative Esch, in reporting his bill, charges that the railroads, so long as they make reports of accidents, will not accept their share of responsibility.

407 Killed in Year. A statement furnished me by the Interstate Commerce Commission shows that for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1931, there were seventy-eight accidents involving the loss of 407 lives and the injury of 1,341 persons, which should have been investigated.

MOVE POSTOFFICE, CITIZENS ADVISE

The proposition to remove the city postoffice to the vicinity of the new Union Station was indorsed at a meeting of the North Washington Citizens' Association in the parish hall of the Church of the Advent last night.

He suggested also the installation of a pneumatic tube service from the postoffice to the Capitol and House of Representatives and Senate buildings, and the installation of a branch office in the old Postoffice, the remainder of the building to be used by the Postoffice Department.

Upon motion of J. D. Kiefer, the association adopted a resolution requesting the Commissioners to continue their efforts toward opening Elm street to Bryant and W streets, west from Flagler place, to Second street northwest.

Experiment With Signals.

Experiments will begin shortly, with various safety devices and signaling systems, on different roads, to decide definitely what are the best devices of this kind. Last Congress made an appropriation for these investigations, and hundreds of inventors have offered their ideas.

Incidentally, it is reported that big and powerful interests are already busy in the effort to secure official indorsement of their methods of preventing accident. Any corporation whose devices is adopted, or most highly recommended, in the forthcoming reports, will have made a fortune.




