

BOY STABS CHUM; PLAYS WILD WEST

Sobbing, He Carries Unconscious Comrade to Hospital.

NEW YORK, March 11.—A boy staggered into the office of the Eastern District Hospital, in Williamsburg, yesterday afternoon, carrying a smaller boy, blood-stained and unconscious, in his arms.

"He's my chum, doc," he managed to say. "We were playing a Wild West show in de street and I struck him with my knife. But I didn't mean to do it—no on your life. Say, doc, don't tell me he's goin' to die."

The little victim was Cephus Jerolomon, thirteen years old, of 116 South Third street, Williamsburg. There was a gash in his right breast through which the keen blade of a penknife had reached the lung.

The sobbing boy, who had carried the sufferer to the hospital, was John Rider, fifteen years old, of 86 South Third street. It was in front of Rider's home that the boys of the neighborhood had started the Wild West show.

Guarding an imaginary stage coach, Rider met the onslaught of pedestrians with high courage. He had armed himself with a penknife.

Under the excitement of the attack, forgetting the open blade in his hand, he struck and Jerolomon fell at his feet. There was a great red stain on the breast of the lad's shirt, where the knife had pierced his chest.

Rider, beside himself with terror and grief, hurried away the knife and gathered his unconscious chum in his arms. Then, staggering under the weight, he hurried as fast as his tottering legs would carry him to the Eastern District Hospital. Fortunately it was only a block away.

Last night the wounded boy, still in a precarious condition, was removed to his home, against the advice of the hospital surgeons. Beside him walked young Rider, with tear-redened eyes. There will be no arrest. The injured boy's father refuses to make any complaint.

DISTRICT MEASURES COMING UP IN SENATE

As soon as the Aldrich currency bill is out of the way in the Senate a number of important measures that have been held back on account of it and that their return will be pushed to the front. Among these will be bills of moment to the District.

The District child labor bill will be one of these. Senator Dooliver intends to force this to the front, as he regards this subject as of vital importance. Senator Beveridge continues in his determination to try to attach an amendment to it his bill for the regulation of child labor throughout the country.

The legislative, executive, and judicial appropriations bill is nearly ready to be reported out of the Senate Appropriations Committee, and may be presented Thursday or Friday.

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EIGHT FIGHTING SHIPS SOON TO BE FINISHED

The rapidity with which the vessels that are to form the nucleus for a new Atlantic fleet are approaching completion, at which time they will be put into commission as full-fledged fighting ships, is indicated in the report of progress on vessels under construction issued by the Navy Department today.

The ships within a few points of the 100 mark in the percentage of completion are the Idaho, battleship, \$2,25; New Hampshire, battleship, \$9,39; North Carolina, armored cruiser, \$9; Montana, armored cruiser, \$4,96; Chester, scout cruiser, \$8,38; Birmingham, scout cruiser, \$6,69; Salem, scout cruiser, \$4,31; Submarine No. 9, \$9.

Of the other battleships under construction, the South Carolina is \$9,95 completed; Michigan, \$5; Delaware, 12,77; and the North Dakota, 21,40. The last two are of the Dreadnought type.

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
