

90-CENT GAS PLAN DUE TOMORROW

Question Will Be Called Before House District Committee.

On the result of the meeting of the House District Committee tomorrow will depend largely whether the people of Washington will have 90-cent gas voted to them before this session of Congress adjourns.

The bill for a child labor law will be considered by the committee tomorrow. It is thought that action will be had by the committee tomorrow in order to have the bill considered in the House.

Speaking of the matter Mr. Norris said: "This bill applies only to campaign committees which are attempting to influence the results of elections in two or more States. It is interstate in effect. The Federal Government has no power over elections entirely confined to one State; and, strangely enough, it has no power whatever over the elections at which Presidential electors are chosen. Almost nobody, even among the people who appear before our committee, seems to know this. Constitutional power is left in the States to determine how Presidential electors shall be named, and it is a fact that for many years under the Constitution electors were chosen in many States by the legislatures."

Congress' Power in Elections Gradually Augmented by States

By Consolidating the Various State Tickets Commonwealths Have Been Playing Into the Hands of the National Body.

The fact that very few people, even trained constitutional lawyers and publicists, know much about the power of Congress over elections, has been brought out in a most interesting way in connection with the discussion of the bill, just reported, for compelling political committees to make public facts concerning the source of campaign funds.

The bill which the House committee has agreed to report is not entirely satisfactory to anybody, apparently; but it is a step in the direction in which many have wished to travel. Representative Norris of Nebraska was entrusted with the business of writing the report on the bill, although the measure was written and introduced by Representative McCall of Massachusetts.

Playing to Congress. "Under this power the States have been playing into the hands of Congress by consolidating their elections. Most of the States elect their State tickets, Legislatures, etc., at the same time that they choose Representatives, Presidential electors, etc. Consequently Congress, by reason of its power over elections of the members of the lower house, gains power over all. "It is rather curious and interesting that the States completely control elections of both Presidential electors and of the members of Legislatures, who choose Senators. But it is a fact. The publicity legislation now proposed is a step in the right direction. It is not presented as more than that. We believe it would work, and would stand the test of the courts." But most of the people who appear before the committee made it very apparent that they knew nothing whatever about the limitations of Federal power over the elections which make up the official of the Federal Government. The States arrange the legislation governing the selection of the President and Senators, so that the Federal Government has almost no voice in it.

Could Select Electors.

"Every legislature in the country could today, with perfect propriety, pass a law providing that hereafter the electors for President and Vice President should be chosen by the legislature. "But, while this true, it is also a fact that Congress has entire power over those elections at which Representatives in Congress are chosen. Congress could fix every detail concerning these elections. So, still further, it determines the arrangements of elections at which Representatives in Congress are chosen, even though State and county and township officers are elected at the same time.

Senator Owen of Oklahoma has consented to deliver the introductory address at Continental Hall next Monday evening, when Senator R. L. Taylor of Tennessee will deliver a lecture on "Competition." The proceeds will be devoted to the fund for the erection of the monument at Arlington in memory of those members of the famous troupe of Rough Riders who fell in action.
