TWO TONS OF CORAL REACH NEW YORK

Largest Specimen Ever Landed in Any Port Brought by the Spray.

NEW YORK, June 4.—Capt. Joshua Slocum, lone skipper of the Itasca, brought his little sloop Spray into quarantine, and on her deck was the largest specimen of coral ever landed in any country.

With the aid of Captain Slocum and a squad of natives the coral was pried off the reef of Golden Bay, near Andros Island, one of the Bahamas, by Prof. B. E. Dahlgren, of the American Museum of Natural History.

The voyage of the ten-ton sloop which has ended, completed nearly 3,000 knots, which began last November, when the Spray and her mate occupied sailed from Martha's Vineyard, Mass.
