Dayton Aeronaut May Not Come Until Last of the Month.

No one at Fort Myer has heard word from Orville Wright, one of the owners of the aeroplane which is to participate in the Fort Myer trials later in the month.

Lieutenants Lahn, Selfridge, and Furlow, several enlisted men, and Captain Baldwin were all working about the machine this morning, and waiting for the wind to die down.

Captain Baldwin is satisfied with the speed of the machine, but admits that its machine cost more than the \$5,737.50 that is to be given him for the board of the Wright aeroplane.

RECORD VOYAGE BY GERMAN STEAMER

Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse Arrives in Quarantine After Fast Passage.

QUARANTINE, N. Y., Aug. 18.—The steamer Kaiser, Wilhelm Der Grosse which arrived today from Bremen, Southampton and Cherbourg came over the short course of 3,047 miles, making the passage in five days sixteen hours and fifty-one minutes, thus arriving at an unusually early hour at Quarantine, where she was promptly cleared.

SLEEPY JUROR HELD FOR CONTEMPT

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 18.—John Brogan, a juror, fell asleep during the hearing of a case in the district court here today, disrupted the proceedings, and was held to show cause why he should not be fined for contempt of court.

An important damage case was before the court, that of Charles Hunter and Charles Moore, both of Philadelphia, in which the latter sues for alleged illegal ejection from the Hotel Maryland, after receiving a season's lease on the house. Brogan dropped asleep at 10:15 in the midst of the testimony, and it required the combined efforts of Judge, A. J. Jones, and court attendants to arouse him. The case had to be postponed until tomorrow.

NEGRO'S WHITE WIFE KILLED WITH RAZOR

Woman and Husband Roll Down Stairs While Fighting With Gun and Knife.

ASBURY PARK, N. J., Aug. 18.—Hattie Scott, the white wife of a negro named Randolph Riley, was killed by the man at her home here last night, and in the melee, Riley was so seriously injured that it is thought he cannot survive.

Riley and the woman had a falling-out late in the evening and the woman drew a revolver, she shot Riley in the abdomen. The negro immediately pulled a razor and rushed at his wife. He slashed her terribly. Struggling and fighting, the two tumbled headlong down the stairs and rolled over and over, the woman trying to get possession of the razor. The blade flew from Riley's hand and the woman let go her hold. But the negro pulled another razor and slit the woman's throat.

SWANSON APPOINTS VIRGINIA DELEGATES

RICHMOND, Va., Aug. 18.—Virginia's representatives to the Lakes to the Gulf Deep Waterways Congress, which meets in Chicago for a three-day session October 7, have been named by Governor Swanson.

FURTHER DECREASE IN IMMIGRATION

A Decrease of 72 Per Cent for July Shown by Report Today.

Figures made public by the Bureau of Immigration today show a further decrease in the tide of incoming aliens. During July, only 2,570 immigrants were admitted, a decrease of 72 per cent, as compared with the figures for July, 1927. The number departed from entry—355 last month—is a decrease of 57 per cent over the same month last year.

CHIEF CLERK NAMED AS BANK EXAMINER

Harrison Nesbit, chief clerk of the Department of Commerce and Labor has resigned that position to accept an appointment as special bank examiner. Mr. Nesbit will be stationed in Pittsburgh, Pa. He has grown up with the civil service in Washington and has a large circle of acquaintances in the department.

Netherlands Will Soon Have Squadron of Five Ships in Caribbean.

THE HAGUE, Aug. 18.—The Dutch cruisers Holland and Utrecht were today ordered fitted for as speedy dispatch as possible to Curaçao. August 23 is the date now set for the sailing of the Holland; October 23 for the Utrecht.

BABY'S FINGERS BLINDED MOTHER

EASTPORT, L. I., Aug. 17.—Clutching in her arms her baby, which she could not see because of the child, having blinded her by sticking its little finger in her eye, Mrs. Clifford Barker, wife of an evangelist, was brought in a salubrious to the mainland today.

Mrs. Barker, who was visiting at the Moriches life-saving colony on the beach opposite here, was playing with the child when it suddenly pressed a finger into the left eye. The eye immediately swelled, the inflammation extending to the other eye and producing total blindness.

BATHING POOLS NOT UNSANITARY

Examination of Water Does Not Warrant Closing Them to Public.

A chemical examination of the water in the bathing pools, made by Chemist Curtis, of the Health Department, does not show conditions which would warrant the closing of the pools at this time, says Health Officer Woodward, who is conducting an investigation of the bathing beach.

HEALTH VIOLATORS FINED BY JUDGE
