

IRISH HOME RULE REDMOND'S PROMISE

Nationalist Leader Receives Warm Welcome on Arrival in New York.

GOES TO BOSTON FOR CONVENTION

Wife of Parliamentarian Holds Marriage as Brightest Future for Erin's Women.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—"Home rule for Ireland is as certain as that I now stand on the soil of freedom—as certain as the day follows the night."

This was the greeting of John Redmond, the famous leader of the Irish nationalists in the British parliament, to the big crowd of Irishmen that met him on the White Star liner pier, when the Gaelic roared here today. There was a cheer and some one shouted: "How about a free Irish nation?"

"That is not the question now," replied Mr. Redmond. "What we want now is home rule, and that we will get. The sentiment in favor of it is growing hourly, and its enemies can stop it only a short time further."

"Ireland is making great development in social and educational conditions, and you, our transplanted brothers, may well be proud of her. Her future welfare is assured."

Emigration Falling Off.
"The best sign of rapid improvement in the marked falling off in emigration. Our countrymen are still coming here, but in smaller and smaller numbers every year, and, within a few years, the exodus will have stopped entirely, and many will be coming back."

The Irish cheer rang out when Mr. Redmond ceased talking, and, with his party, he was bundled into a carriage and was escorted to the Hoffman House, where a big reception in his honor will be held tomorrow night.

Mr. Redmond, with Joseph Devlin, member of parliament, and John Fitzgibbon, president of the county council of Roscommon, is a delegate to the convention of the United Irish League, which assembles in Boston September 22 and 23. He will leave for Boston Friday and will address a big meeting in that city on Sunday.

A committee of ladies, headed by Miss Mary O'Flaherty and Mrs. John Flood, greeted Mr. Redmond, and will have charge of her entertainment during her stay here.

Marriage for Women.
"What is the future of the Irish woman?" some one asked.

"Marriage," was the quick answer. "There is no greater future for any woman than marriage. I hope that every Irish girl who comes here will get a good American husband and raise large families of good Irish-Americans."

After the Boston convention is over Mr. Redmond will address a meeting in Philadelphia. He will then tour the West, speaking in Chicago, St. Louis, and other large cities.

SYLVESTER RENEWS BILLBOARD FIGHT

MOTHER LEADS POSSE TO AVENGE CHILD

Waves Men Back While She Fires Two Shots Into Fleeing Negro.

POWDER SPRINGS, Ga., Sept. 15.—After forming and heading a posse to chase Robert Bostick, a negro, who had attacked her nine-year-old daughter, Mrs. Sarah Reed, wife of a prominent citizen, shot the negro as soon as he was overtaken.

Bostick was employed at the Reed home and enticed the little girl into an outhouse, where he attacked her and then fled. When the girl told her mother, Mrs. Reed, her husband not being home, armed herself with a shotgun, formed a posse of neighbors, and led them in pursuit of the negro. After a long chase the negro was discovered hidden behind a log in the woods.

KAISER CAN END WAR, DECLARES CARNEGIE

Iron King's Letter to Bartholdt Read to Peace Delegates in Berlin.

BERLIN, Sept. 15.—Representative Richard Bartholdt of Missouri, president of the American group of the Interparliamentary Union, which is to convene in this city Thursday, has received a letter from Andrew Carnegie, at Skibo Castle, Scotland, in which Mr. Carnegie says:

"I cannot escape the conclusion that the abolition of war among civilized nations as a mode of settling international disputes is very easily accomplished. There will be one man in Berlin while your congress is in session who has only to speak the word. If the Emperor of Germany ever realized his manifest destiny peace would follow. He has it in his power to abolish war among civilized nations. All he has to do is to ask Great Britain, France and the United States to unite with him in declaring that since the world has contracted to 'neighborhood' the time has passed when any one civilized nation can be permitted to break that peace in which all are so deeply interested."

Mr. Bartholdt, on behalf of the American group, presented a peace flag to the German group at a public meeting in the reichstag building.

Umpire's Decision, Which Gave Detroit Its Winning Run, Enrages Fans.


