MAY CANCEL LEASE ON P. O. AT ARDMORE

No Prosecution Likely in Case of Representative Carter, Who Owns Building.

"It was stated officially at the Post-office Department today that it probably would be determined to cancel the lease on the postoffice building at Ardmore, Okla., and no attempt would be made to prosecute Representative Charles D. Carter, of Oklahoma, who is charged with having rented the building to the Government for the past five years in violation of a Federal statute, which prohibits a member of Congress from making any contract with the United States Government.

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LOCKED IN A CELL, TRIES TO END LIFE

Louis Willis, a Negro, Hangs Himself With a Belt, But Will Live.

Louis Willis, a negro, attempted to commit suicide early this morning in his cell at the Eighth precinct police station. Two things go hand in hand with Louis, comeliness behind the bars of a police station and attempt to commit suicide. They toddle along with the congeniality of old friends and as soon as Louis sees one, the other hops up and takes possession of his mind. Louis has the suicide mania, so to speak, when grim justice or a policeman lands him in the police station. It is a humiliating thought, this being locked up, and so, failing to reconcile himself to the idea of the policeman who arrested him last night, he decided to end his life. He fitted a belt neatly around his neck and then swung himself from the cell door. He was discovered early this morning by Policeman E. J. Creamer, who cut the belt. Willis was taken to Freedman's Hospital, where it is believed his condition is not serious.
