

## SUSPECTS CLEARED BY FINDING JEWELS

Missing Property of Mrs.  
"Chick" Stahl Found in  
Father's Home.

BOSTON, Nov. 20.—Four men held here on suspicion of having robbed the dead body of Mrs. Julia Harmon Stahl, wife of "Chick" Stahl, the Boston ball player, who ended his life in the West, are cleared today by the discovery of the dead woman's \$3,000 worth of jewelry in a bureau drawer in her father's home.

When Mr. Stahl's body was found in a South Boston hallway, the jewels were missing, and four men are held here by the police, in connection with her death. They admitted having been with Mrs. Stahl on her fatal night, but denied all knowledge of the robbery. An autopsy has now shown that death was from natural causes, and the men probably will be liberated.

## WOMAN TELLS JUDGE SHE CAN'T BE BOSSSED

Ready to Stay in Jail Until Court  
Gives in to  
Her.

MAY'S LANDING, N. J., Nov. 20.—"Nobody shall boss me; I'll do as I please. I'll stay in jail until you get ready to free me."

So Mrs. Frances Somers, a woman of determination, told Judge Higbee in the orphans' court today, and back to the county jail she went. The Widow Somers, about fifty, is well known in Oceanville. She has been in jail several weeks for contempt of the orphans' court. It ordered her to sell some of her late husband's land and pay his debts. She would not do so. She asked to be released; Judge Higbee told her today that if she was ready to obey the court or give good reasons why the land should not be sold, he would release her. But she flew into a tantrum.

## TENDER POETRY STIRS BENEDICK'S FRIENDS

They Fear Married Man May Get Involved in Scandal  
Until They Learn Poetess "Susie Andrews"  
Is in Reality Scherer's Wife.

RICHMOND, Va., Nov. 20.—Susie Andrews, the mysterious Richmond poetess, who created consternation in the clerical force of the Auditorium Annex, Chicago, Ill., by sending for delivery at that hotel a letter directed to L. L. Scherer, chief special agent for the Chesapeake and Ohio railroad, which letter contained an inscription in verse on the envelope, the publication of which resulted in dumfounding the friends of Scherer, who is a married man, has turned out upon investigation to be no less a person than Mrs. Scherer herself.

Mrs. Scherer's maiden name was Susie Andrews. Mrs. Scherer wrote the communication to her husband in a spirit of fun, never dreaming that it would come under any other than his eyes. Mrs. Scherer, being herself the Susie in question, is, of course, not vexed at what Susie has to say to her husband.

## MASSACRE IS FEARED AT HANDS OF MOROS

Campaign Against Philippine Tribe  
May Be Undertaken  
at Once.

MANILA, Nov. 20.—Disquieting news that reached here today regarding the activity of warlike Moros near Malabang is likely to hasten the campaign for the disarmament of all the Moro tribes in the southern islands.

The big movement against the Moros was originally scheduled for December, but it is feared that any further delay may result in another frightful massacre.

A reconnoitering movement is now being made in the Moros territory and unless it can disperse the Mohammedan fanatics, the most important campaign since the general insurrection of 1898 will be undertaken immediately.

## SULTAN IS ANXIOUS TO GET TELEPHONES

Wants Man to Build System All  
Over Ottoman Empire.

The Turkish government is hunting some one who will undertake the installation of a complete telephone system throughout the empire, according to a communication sent to the department of Commerce and Labor by Vice Consul General Heizer, from Constantinople.

Soon after the establishment of a constitutional government in the Ottoman empire, an order was issued abolishing the former regulations prohibiting the telephone. Now the Turkish government announces that it will receive bids on a complete telephone concession for the entire country during the month of December.

## TERRIBLE STORMS DEVASTATE SICILY

Towns Destroyed and Thousands Homeless, With  
Probable Death Roll.

NAPLES, Nov. 20.—Hundreds of deaths and tremendous loss of property has resulted from the three days of storm and flood, which has ravaged the province of Calabria and a part of the island of Sicily, according to the reports received today from the troops, who were sent out as a relief expedition.

Thousands are homeless, a score of towns have been badly wrecked and shipping destroyed. The country is impassable and communication with parts of the stricken sections so meager that the full extent of the calamity can only be conjectured.

The big death roll resulted from drownings in the flood, destruction of vessels, landslides, and the collapsing of scores of houses.

The storm was the worst that has visited southern Italy in years. Urgent measures are being adopted for the relief of the sufferers and still more troops are being rushed to the scene with orders to take immediate steps to prevent an outbreak of disease.
