When Mr. Stahl's body was found in a South Boston hallway, the jewels were missing, and four men are held here by the police, in connection with her death. They admitted having been with Mrs. Stahl on her fatal night, but denied all knowledge of the robbery.

An autopsy has now shown that death was from natural causes, and the mer probably will be liberated.
