Window Glass. Preceding consideration of print paper the Senate took up window glass, as adopted after discussion of the Finance Committee amendment, as revised, and as submitted by Senator McCumber. A sharp discussion was caused by this question. The effect of the action taken is to reduce the duties on common window glass considerably below the Dingley rates.

Paper Taken Up. Prior to the consideration of window glass, the Senate considered the rates on various kinds of paper of the more expensive types. The Finance Committee rates were established. Senator Bristow sharply opposed the duties which the body proposed to fix on bond paper.

REVISION ASSURED BY TAFT POSITION

News That President Would Veto Bill Responsible for Conciliatory Attitude of Leaders—Story Printed in The Times.

By JAMES HAY, Jr. It can no longer be doubted that the President has obtained from the Senate and House leaders what amounts to a specific pledge that the conferees on the tariff bill will make the measure one embodying the principle of downward revision.

Today, following visits to the President by Seneca Payne, chairman of the House Committee on Ways and Means, and Representative Dwight of New York, the Republican "wing" there was heard at the Capitol a similar report that the leaders of the House have told Mr. Taft of the practical certainty of his succeeding in signing a tariff bill which will be a measure for downward revision.

CEMETERY COMPANY UNDER HEAVY FIRE

Charge Failure to Account for \$175,000 Worth of Certificates.

Creditors from several parts of the country, particularly from New York city, are expected to come forward with claims following the filing of the petition by McNeil & McNeil, attorneys of this city, against the Forest Lake Cemetery Company, which its president, George B. Starkweather, is charged with having failed to account for about \$175,000 worth of certificates of indebtedness.

This petition is said to be but the opening gun of a series of suits which Messrs. McNeil & McNeil, who represent the claims of John F. Sandy, William P. Irving, H. A. Hanes, Daniel W. Oliver, and C. F. Thompson, of this city, declare will show that the cemetery company is hopelessly insolvent.

According to the petition on record at Marlboro, Md., the Forest Lake Cemetery was incorporated in 1886 by George B. Starkweather and John H. Webb, of Washington; John W. Warner, of Rockville; Joshua H. Clark, of Takoma Park; and F. H. Slier, of Chantemont Heights, Md. In 1887, it is declared, \$37,000 worth of so-called certificates of indebtedness of improved certificates, intended to provide for extensive improvements to the cemetery, were sold. They were to run ten years and bore 8 per cent. When the principal fell due in 1897, the company defaulted. Since 1897 a total of \$175,000 worth of these certificates have been issued by Starkweather, who is charged by the petitioners with having failed to account for the money and declined to make a statement for the information of the creditors. Most of these certificates are said to be held by persons in New York.

The cemetery property, valued at about \$30,000, is now in the hands of William A. Harrison, receiver. A hearing regarding the alleged insolvency of the company will be held at Marlboro on July 5. No answer has as yet been filed by Mr. Starkweather.

MAYOR SHEEHAN WEDS.

ELMIRA, June 17.—Mayor Daniel Sheehan, of Elmira, member of the State Democratic Committee, this morning married Miss Ellen Loretta O'Herron, formerly of this place. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Father J. Foley in St. Cecilia's Church. Later a nuptial high mass was celebrated. Mayor Sheehan and bride left for a wedding trip up the Great Lakes.

HIGH PAPER DUTY SCORED BY BROWN

Nebraska Senator Calls It "Inexcusable"—Needs No Protection.

Declaring that the amendment of the Finance Committee increasing the paper rate fixed by the House on print paper "is inexcusable and indefensible from any standpoint," Senator Brown, (Rep. Neb.), today attacked that schedule of the tariff bill in a speech in the Senate. "The print paper mill industry in this country needs no protection," he declared. "Those mills already have an advantage over every foreign print mill whether it stands in Scandinavia, Germany, or Canada."

"Canada is our only competitor in this market. The seas and the inferior product of other countries than Canada protect the mills of the United States against all competition worth mentioning. This question depends on the cost of production at home and abroad. If foreigners can manufacture print paper for less than it costs Americans, that amendment of the Finance Committee might find justification.

MONUMENT PLANNED FOR JOHN SEVIER

Representative Austin of Tennessee today introduced a resolution authorizing the Commissioners of the District to cause to be erected a monument or statue in memory of Gen. John Sevier, the hero of the battle of Kings Mountain. The bill carries an appropriation of \$25,000, and provides that the statue, so far as possible, shall be made of Tennessee marble.

RUBENS BURNED.

NAMUR, Belgium, June 17.—The historic church of Marialine, which contained a valuable Rubens, has been destroyed by fire.

\$8,000 TO AID CLERGYMEN.

MIDDLETOWN, N. Y., June 17.—The will of the Rev. Oscar Haviland, who was a Methodist clergyman of Walden, gives \$8,000 to the fund for superannuated preachers of the New York Conference after the death of Mrs. Haviland. The remainder of the estate is left to the wife.

DREADNOUGHTS FOR CZAR.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 17.—The keels of four 20,000-ton battleships of the Greater Dreadnought type were laid in St. Petersburg, two built at the Gornia yards and two at the Baltic works. These vessels will be 608 feet long, with eighty-two-foot beam, will have a speed of twenty knots an hour and carry in their main batteries ten twelve-inch guns. The hull will be of a special nickel steel.

REFERRED TO COURT.

BOSTON, June 17.—The joint legislative committee on railroads and street railways has reported reference to the next general court of the petition to permit the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad to own stock in the Berkshire street railway. If the report is accepted, it is expected the Legislature will be prorogued on Saturday.




