Water Department's Activity Results in Big Reduction Of Squandering.

With an increase in the population of 6,000 during the past year, the daily consumption of water in the District of Columbia was reduced from 64.5 million gallons to 61.2 million gallons...

These results, says McFarland, are attributable to three causes: The location and stoppage of underground leaks; careful house-to-house inspection; and the increased use of meters.

During the year underground leaks and the illegitimate use of water were discovered aggregating a flow of 9,561,000 gallons a day.

National Association Opens Its Matches—Endowment Fund Planned.

CAMP PERRY, Ohio, Aug. 28.—The National Rifle Association of America this morning opened its twenty-seventh annual tournament—the matches which were shot at Sea Girt until the National matches were brought to Camp Perry in 1907.

Two championship contests will be decided today—the company team and the regimental.

Robert Mankoski, of California, and Capt. William C. Harlee, captain of the U. S. Marine Corps team, are the new directors.

Adjutant General Rumbold, of Missouri, gave the association a trophy for the regimental championship match, in which the Sixth Massachusetts a year ago became owner of the trophy.

Hon. J. M. Dickinson, Hon. George Von Meyer, Lieut. Gen. John C. Bates, U. S. A., retired, and Robert Bacon, were elected honorary directors for life.

The association directed the directors to urge Congress to appropriate funds to meet all the necessary expenses of the 1908 national matches.
