

CANTILLON THERE FULL OF BUSINESS

Search Fails to Reveal New Manager for Nationals This Day—Commission's Nerve to Receive Hard Test—Washington Hitters.

Two games today. No, the new manager for the Washington ball team was not being shown around town this morning. No new manager had appeared, hence the failure to extend him this useful courtesy. Joe Cantillon and Germany Schaefer were still busily engaged in selecting pitchers for the doubleheader with New York today, and in discussing possible trades and sales.

Don't worry about it. It's a good hunch that Doc Gessler will be in our midst next year.

The great topic of discussion among the ball players today is: Will the national commission go through with it and suspend Johnny Kling for three years because he played the games at Logan Square semi-professionally? About half the players are under the impression that the commission will lack the nerve to put such a famous and valuable performer out of business, especially if he and Charley Murphy, president of the Chicago Cubs, come to terms. On the other hand, they are inclined to believe that if Kling were not a well-known star he would get rough treatment from the commission. There is a rapidly growing impression that the commission is not dealing evenly and without favor. What caused this more than any one thing was the reinstatement of Hal Chase after he deliberately jumped the New York Americans. If the governing body in baseball were to suspend Kling and make an example of him it would go a long way in the direction of making itself a real power, instead of quite a joke—which it has sometimes been, though generally it has

been more able and conscientious than the public knew.

Cleveland is wavering more and more the more the season advances. It is not a joke that Washington leads the American League in 300 hitters. Slattery is a new man and is probably hitting somewhat beyond his natural gait. But, there is no more reason why he should not wallop the ball at that clip than anybody else. Lelivelt has impressed the fans as a man who should hit, and there is no surprise that he is in the honor class. His way of standing at the plate and sleeping into the shoots is a comfort, and it made a hit with Mike Kahoe, who never saw him play but twice, and saw him strike out twice in the second game. Gessler is a hitter who has been in the league long enough to have the pitchers learn his weak points, but he is still fooling them with those long smashes that have been the wonder of the Washington populace when he was with Boston. Gessler and Lelivelt both have a perfect right to be among the 300, and Slattery may yet be there, even after he has been sequestered.

Lee Tannehill made three hits in the first game with St. Louis yesterday, and none in the second.

The departure of Charley Smith to Boston, marking the last of the men who were here when Cardillon arrived, is significant of the plans of the Washington club to build up an entirely new organization. Whether it will be successful remains to be seen. The old one could not win, and the new one will have to be rounded into shape. It will take another year, at least, to determine the strength of the present combination, and do not bet more than even money that Cantillon will not be here to see what he can do with what he has picked up.

HAS CHICAGO A CHANCE?

The Pirates have twenty-six games left to play this season and the Cubs twenty-five, including postponed contests, in the race for the National League baseball championship. If Chicago wins twenty and loses five the team will close the season with a percentage of .701. If Pittsburgh wins sixteen and loses ten the Pirates will close the season with the same percentage. This means that the Pirates can lose twice as many games as the Cubs and still tie them for the pennant. On October 2, 3 and 4 Pittsburgh plays in Chicago. Even if the Cubs win every game from now to the end of the season, including these three, and the Pirates do, too, except these three, Pittsburgh will win. This is figured on the basis that each team plays its full schedule of 154 games.

HEYDLER WITNESSED CENTRAL ELEVEN TO START EARLY

Unknown to Either Club, League President Saw the Whole Affair.

Candidates Will Be Given First Workout Next Monday Afternoon.

PITTSBURG, Sept. 11.—It came out today that President John Heydler, of the National League, was a spectator unknown to either the Pittsburgh or Chicago teams on last Tuesday when the Cubs became so obstreperous, and for which Chance and Tinker were put out of the game. It is this game which Chicago has protested.

Heydler was in Pittsburgh on Monday and was thought to have left for New York that night. Instead, it appears he had simply changed hotels, and being in town on Tuesday, had gone to Forbes Field as an outsider, paying his way in to see the game without it being known that he was there.

He accordingly heard all the hard talk of the Chicago players which resulted in their being laid off, and imposed the fines accordingly.

VIOLA, Ill., Sept. 11.—Two world records were broken in a registered shooting tournament held here September 8 and 9.


