

# TOUR BIG SUCCESS AS RELIABILITY TEST

## After 1,300 Miles of Mixed Roads Cars Make Good Showing.

ing. Each set is penalized if found defective. All of the cars took the outdoor tests in good shape, but no line on their actual performance as regarded by Referee Trego and his associates on the technical committee, can be obtained until the final score is compiled after the technical examination.

A striking feature of yesterday's outdoor test was the splendid manner in which the brakes of the various cars held. It is customary on long and hard runs of this character to allow the contestants to adjust their brakes when half the tour is completed, but every car in the Munsey tour made the entire trip of 1,300 miles without any adjustment of the brakes, and the way they held during the tests was a revelation to many.

### Examination of Cars.

At the completion of the tests, Chairman Trego and Messrs. Overpeck and Casard, who compose the technical committee, began the work of examining the cars for any defects that may be found. This examination is a duplicate of the preliminary one made before the cars began the tour, and of which record is made on the reserved part of the preliminary inspection card.

The technical committee worked all night and finished with the last car at 11 o'clock this morning. Immediately after the conclusion of the floral parade, there will be a meeting of the drivers and observers at the tour headquarters in the Munsey Building, at which time the observers' cards for the three days' running between Boston and Washington will be gone over. This formally over, Referee Trego will then make up the record of each car, showing in detail its performance each day of the tour. This data will be ready by the time the smoker begins at the New Willard tonight, and winners will then be announced. The automobile world is awaiting this announcement with the greatest interest.


### Referee's Work.

Some idea of the immense amount of work that falls to the lot of the referee of an extended reliability contest may be gained from the fact that not only must he keep a sharp eye on all the contestants, but in addition he must have the attention of each driver and observer at each night control. The round of pleasures provided for the Munseyites in the several cities where night stops were made served to draw the observers and drivers away from the meeting and for this reason it was not possible to compile any scores for the last three running days.

In addition to watching the driver of the car to which they were assigned, the observers were also instructed to watch for any stops made by other cars and to note the time of each stop, together with what the driver was doing. In this way the referee had a complete check on all the cars and in working it out an immense amount of detail work was involved.




