

POLICE KILL WHEN HE RESISTS ARREST

Man Who Shot at Neighbor and at Officers Dead After Fight.

NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 1.—In a revolver duel with four policemen, whom he had threatened to kill if they persisted in serving a warrant for his arrest, Albert Demarest, who was recently left a small fortune, received injuries in his room at 62 Watchung avenue, West Orange, last night, from which he died two hours later in the Orange Memorial Hospital. He was wanted for shooting at Adam G. Marshall, who lives in the same house.

Demarest fired four times at the bluecoats as they burst open his door. His bullets went wild. The police returned the fire. Although he was made the target of a fusillade of shots, only two bullets struck Demarest, one entering the left breast above the heart and the other penetrating the abdomen.

"You've got me, boys," he said as he fired the last shot. He then staggered to the bed near by, fell across, and was soon unconscious. One of the four policemen ran outside and telephoned for an ambulance, which took him to the hospital.

The police declare that they fired in self-defense and had no alternative.

An attempt to end the life of his neighbor, Adam G. Marshall, earlier in the night, started the train of circumstances which led to Demarest's death. Demarest, who had been drinking, fired a shot at Marshall as the latter remonstrated with him for abusing Mrs. Annie Goddard, from whom they rented rooms.

VICTIMS OF VACCINE STILL UNCONSCIOUS

Boston Children Believed to Have Been Made Ill by Bad Material.

BOSTON, Oct. 1.—The cases of two little girls who have lain unconscious here for several days as the result of vaccination have stirred anti-vaccinationists of the city to a vigorous crusade against the system now in force for school children.

The two children are Margaret Jones, the fourteen-year-old daughter of R. V. Jones, and Bertha Hudson, the eight-year-old child of Harvey Hudson. Following vaccination, according to the regulations of the public schools, several days ago, both little girls lay in a comatose condition and all efforts to revive them are proving futile. They are being fed artificially. Neither appears to be paralyzed and the cases are beyond the solution of the physicians.

Examination and analysis of the vaccine used is to be made.

FALLIERES GREETED CHEFTEK PASHA, TURK

French President Meets Virtual Military Ruler of Ottoman Empire.

PARIS, Oct. 1.—With great formality and ceremony, President Fallieres today received Cheftek Pasha, virtually military ruler of Turkey. In response to a formal speech of greeting by Fallieres, the Turkish general gave an extended discussion of Turkey's prospects for the future, predicting the steady growth of the Ottoman Empire in power and territory.

Cheftek Pasha leaves Paris tonight for Marseilles, whence he will return to Constantinople. The Turks in Paris have arranged a great demonstration in his honor with a big parade which will escort him through the streets to the depot.

WELLESLEY GIRLS AFRAID OF HUGGER

Students Go About Armed With Pistols, Hoping to Shoot Intruder.

WELLESLEY, Mass., Oct. 1.—The activities of a "Jack the Hugger" have produced a condition bordering on panic among the students at Wellesley and the women of the town. Scores of pretty Wellesley girls are armed with revolvers to defend themselves if they meet the "hugger," and the police are employing every method in an effort to capture him.

The "hugger's" stamping—or "logging"—ground is the road which skirts a small wood near here.

MURDERER OF GIRL SENTENCED TO HANG

Emil Victor Will Expiate His Crime on November 16 in Aberdeen, S. D.

ABERDEEN, S. D., Oct. 1.—Emil Victor, convicted of the murder of Mildred Christie, eighteen years old, was today sentenced to be hanged November 16, in Aberdeen.

Victor was accused also of murdering Mildred Christie's father and mother, and Michael Ronayne, a guest of the Christie family, but was tried only for the murder of the girl.

The motive for the crime was robbery.

WALSH, BANKRUPT, FAILS TO SETTLE

CHICAGO, Oct. 1.—John R. Walsh, the convicted banker, is bankrupt. He failed to take advantage of the last minute of grace to settle the quarterly interest on the \$7,121,887 term the Chicago Clearing House Association and Associated Banks are carrying against him.

Walsh is gloomily awaiting the decision of the United States Court of Appeals, which will be handed down next Tuesday. Should the decision be against him, there will be nothing but the United States Supreme Court between him and the penitentiary.

G. O. P. IS AFTER YOUNG VIRGINIANS

ROANOKE, Va., Oct. 1.—Suggesting that a large number of young and progressive men of the State of Virginia be enlisted in the Republican ranks during the coming elections in that State, President Taft has written to Representative C. B. Stemp, State Republican chairman.

The President says that these enlistments should be made from young men, "who, without abating in the slightest degree their pride in their section and its history, are nevertheless anxious to array themselves on the progressive side in politics."

ARMY RATIONS FOR CYCLONE VICTIMS

Following a recommendation of Colonel Foot, of Jackson barracks, St. W. Wotherspoon, acting chief of staff, by direction of the Secretary of War, authorized the issue of 20,000 short rations to the cyclone sufferers in Terrebonne parish, La. The action was taken at the request of Senator Foster and Representative Broussard. Colonel Foot's recommendation included 100 tents and 300 blankets, but Secretary Dickinson, finding that there was no appropriation available from which these could be supplied, was able to issue only the short army rations.

GIRL FACES CHARGE

RICHMOND, Va., Oct. 1.—Miss Mary Walker, whose father is connected with the American Tobacco Company, has been formally charged with having caused the death of Mrs. M. G. Gathright, sixty-three years old, by running her down in an automobile. A warrant was served upon the wealthy Miss Walker at her home.
