Big Shake-up Expected in Personnel of Government Officials.

INSURGENTS TO GET LITTLE PATRONAGE

Department of Justice and Treasury Will Get Many New Bureau Heads.

By J. C. WELLIVER. Beginning with the opening of the session of Congress next month, changes in the personnel of the Government are going to take place rapidly and some of them in unexpected places.

Patronage matters are going to attract more attention than at any previous time since the change of administration.

Right or wrong, no little political significance is being attached to the series of prospective changes. Members of the Cabinet are now casting about for new men to replace left-over appointees.

While eager speculation was going on during the long Cabinet meeting of Tuesday, as to the matters under discussion, the relations with Chile and with Central America were the subject of animated discussion and conjecture on the outside.

There are also to be a considerable number of very important changes in the Treasury Department, according to reports.


Directed Against Insurgents. Matters of personnel, as to the men who are to be appointed, have not been determined in most instances.

BUSINESS MEN WIN VICTORY IN COUNCIL

Alexandria Votes for Road Improvement Through Efforts of Chamber.

WASHINGTON TIMES BUREAU, ALEXANDRIA, VA., NOV. 24. The Alexandria chamber of commerce scored a victory last evening, when the city council, by a vote of 9 to 7, appropriated \$1000 to construct a twenty-four-foot roadway in North Washington street, from Wylie street to the corporation line.

The committee on streets reported favorably on the resolution to pave North Washington street several months ago, but the resolution was laid on the table.

The chamber of commerce passed resolutions, urging the construction of the roadway, and at the last meeting of the city council the matter was again brought up.

After an animated debate, in which the chamber of commerce was criticized, the matter was laid over.

At the meeting last evening, A. D. Brockett, representing the chamber of commerce, was given the privileges of the floor and gave a succinct account of the advantages to be derived by the construction of the roadway.

The committee will endeavor to obtain at the next session of Congress the passage of an amendment including the District of Columbia in the act appropriating \$50,000 to each State and Territory maintaining a university containing in its curriculum a course in agriculture and the mechanic arts.
