WARRINER ENJOYS HIMSELF IN PRISON

Evidence in Big Four Theft Case Disappears—Authorities Seem Indifferent.

CINCINNATI, Nov. 23.—The disappearance of witnesses and evidence continues almost daily in the Warriner Big Four shuntage case, wherein \$62,000 is admitted to have been embezzled.

A curious feature of the case which has resulted in public comment is the seeming lack of concern by the railroad officials and attorneys and the fact that Warriner as a prisoner is being accorded privileges never known here before.

A letter from her sister, who is lived in New York since her divorce from a prominent Newport (Ky.) man, several years ago, and it is thought she has gone to stay with her.

Developments indicate that the information said to be in her possession will be valuable in the prosecution of the case against Mrs. Ford-Stewart and Warriner.

A letter from her sister was received by her the day of her departure, which she tore into minute pieces and then burned. It is known that she is traveling under an assumed name, as she did not give her own name in ordering the express company to call for her trunk.
