

THREE ARE HELD FOR BOY'S MURDER

New York Police Believe Lomas Shooting Was Act of Pervert.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—Every doubtful looking individual who has a few days' growth of beard on his face is being arrested on suspicion of being implicated in the murder of Robbie Lomas and the possible fatal shooting of Arthur Sibley, the six-year-old boys who were shot down in Highbridge Park, in the Bronx, Wednesday afternoon. Of the scores of men who have been arrested, three still are held.

PLAYGROUNDS BILL MAY BE AMENDED

Government Asked to Contribute to Amount District Will Pay.

In a letter to the members of the Senate Committee on the District of Columbia, Vice President Arthur C. Moses and Secretary James E. West, of the Washington Playgrounds Association, have asked that several changes be made in the items of the bill as passed by the House whereby all funds payable for the use of the playgrounds association are to be paid out of the District revenues instead of making it available under the half and half agreement.

MORE PAY DEMANDED.
