MISS WILSON WINS SUCCESS BY VOICE

Cabinet Officer's Salary Less Than Daughter's Concert Profits.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 18.—Miss Flora Wilson, daughter of James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture, can earn more by singing than her father can by investigating crops and promoting the animal industry for the United States Government.

Miss Wilson, who has arrived in this city as the guest of Mrs. Florence Fox, 2128 Spruce street, is one of the most successful concert singers in the country. She has a colorful soprano voice, and musical experts declare that she is one of the few singers who can reach high F. She takes E with perfect facility.

Possessing these Tetrazzini vocal qualities, Miss Wilson naturally had an ambition to appear in opera, and two years ago she forsook Washington social life and made her first appearance as a concert singer in Paris.

She found that her wonderful vocal range was a magic gift, and before the end of the year she was able to show a net financial result which was greater than the United States Government's check to her father.

Miss Wilson is now keen about her career, and while she is in this city it is likely that she will sing for Oscar Hammerstein. She will give a concert at the Bellevue-Stratford, and a number of prominent society women, including Mrs. Philander C. Knox, wife of the Secretary of State, will attend.

Among the selections she will sing at this concert, in which she will be assisted by Ver Fries Pollock, tenor of the Metropolitan company, and Karl Klein, violinist, are the mad scene from "Lucia," the shadow song from "Dionora," the Violetta music from "Traviata," and other well-known Italian compositions suited to her florid style. A reception was given yesterday by Mrs. Fox in honor of Miss Wilson.

SCIENTISTS NAMING MOORE'S SUCCESSOR

Directors of National Geographic Society Electing President This Afternoon.

A successor to Prof. Willis L. Moore, chief of the Weather Bureau, as president of the National Geographic Society will be elected at a meeting of the board of directors of the society late this afternoon at Hubbard Memorial Hall.

Great interest has been manifested in this election ever since Professor Moore announced definitely his intention of declining re-election. Although several names have been suggested as his successor, among them Rear Admiral Chester and Prof. A. O. Titman, of the Coast and Geodetic Survey, the election is considered a wide-open one.

Among the members of the society it is a matter of favorable comment that the new president will find the organization in flourishing shape, both financially and in membership. Under President's Moore's guidance, the membership in the past year has grown to nearly 90,000.
