

which he shall be appointed. All members of the municipal assembly shall be appointed for a period of two years.

Every order, resolution, vote or other official act of the municipal assembly under the authority of this act, shall, before it becomes effective, be presented to the governor of the District of Columbia; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not, he shall return it, with his objection, to the assembly, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal and proceed to reconsider it.

Members of the Municipal Assembly shall before they enter upon their official duties take and subscribe to the following oath or affirmation: "I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I shall support the Constitution of the United States and faithfully discharge the duties of the office on which I am about to enter; that I have not accepted, nor will I accept or receive directly or indirectly any other valuable thing for any vote or influence that I may give or withhold upon any resolution, ordinance, regulation or other official act. The members thus appointed to the municipal assembly shall first meet at such time and place as the governor shall appoint, but thereafter the time and place and manner of meeting and the formation of districts or sections for the purpose of electing members of the assembly shall be selected, shall be done by the municipal assembly by regulation duly prescribed, a majority of the members of the municipal assembly shall constitute a quorum; the said assembly shall determine the rules of its procedure and may elect its own officers, and the presiding officer shall be acting governor in the absence of the governor herein provided for. The governor shall call the assembly to order at the opening of each term.

PERFECTING PLANS FOR DASH TO POLE

Members of the board of managers of the National Geographic Society declared today they would not grass grow under their feet in getting the society's expedition for the South Pole under way.

At informal conferences this morning ways and means of raising the \$50,000 necessary to equip the expedition were discussed, and it is probable that no public subscription will be asked but that the money will be raised from the membership of the society.

"A meeting of the board of managers probably will be called as soon as we can communicate with Commander Peary," declared Charles J. Bell, a member of the board of managers, and chairman of the finance committee, "and at that meeting definite plans for quick work in raising the amount needed will be made."

Members to Raise Fund. "It does not think it likely," declared Mr. Bell, "that it will be necessary to go outside the society for funds. Our membership exceeds 25,000 members, and from them I should think it would be easy to raise \$50,000 in short order. Just how it will be done I do not know, of course, and that will not be decided until the managers meet."

One of the first things to be done when the board meets, it was predicted today, will be to tender Commander Peary a vote of thanks for the \$10,000 he added to the fund for fitting out the expedition last night.

"I think Commander Peary's act was one of the greatest known to date, the true spirit of the man," said Mr. Bell, "and I for one want to put the society on record at the earliest possible time, as appreciating to the fullest his gift."

Provide for Emergency. It was said today that the gift of Commander Peary would not deter the society from trying to raise the full amount agreed upon, \$50,000, and that the added \$10,000 will be placed in reserve as an emergency fund, and probably will be needed before the explorers return.

Though the managers met in closed session yesterday, it became known today that they agreed upon the route suggested by Commander Peary at the dinner given by Dr. Alexander Graham Bell on February 1. This agreement was added, it was said, by the favorable report of the research committee, of which Dr. Henry Gannett, president of the society, is chairman.

The American expedition will approach the South Pole from a point exactly opposite that taken by the British expedition. The explorations will become a race of nations for the Pole, with Americans taking the longest odds. The route taken by the British is fairly well known on account of previous expeditions, which reached various distances from the Pole. But the route of the American expedition is less well known.

May Meet Unknown Obstacles. If conditions are what such eminent explorers as Commander Peary and others think they are, the Americans will have all the best of it. But unknown obstacles are likely to be encountered which will put the Stars and Stripes under an unexpected handicap. The American party will also have farther to go than the British expedition.

Even the spot that will be used as a base of the American expedition is not yet known. There is some doubt as to whether the Roosevelt will be able to find a safe harbor. According to present plans the expedition should reach Coates Land by March. If conditions are favorable from that point the South Pole should be reached by December 21, 1911.

An effort will be made, it was said today, to obtain the crew for the expedition as that which went with the expedition to the North Pole, Captain Bartlett Peary's right hand man on the Northern expedition, probably will be in charge of the Southern expedition. His lieutenants probably will include Captain McMillen, George Borup, and Matt Henson.

NEW TRAIL FOUND OF DOCTOR COOK

NEW YORK, Feb. 8.—If Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the arctic explorer, will call at the check room of the Waldorf-Astoria, a large bundle which he evidently overlooked at the time of his hurried departure from the hotel to the Granatun Hotel, Bronxville, will be returned to him.

The bundle was checked several months ago by Dr. Cook in his sojourn at the hotel, immediately following his lecture tour. It was not until yesterday that attention was called to the bundle by the attendant in charge of the check room, who reported the matter to the management. The man in charge had his curiosity aroused by the paper which emanated from inside the paper wrapping.

When this wrapping was removed yesterday before the bundle was identified as belonging to Dr. Cook, the inside covering was found to be the skin of some arctic animal, thought to be musk ox. This led to the final identification of the owner of the bundle.

PEARY CONTRIBUTES TO SOUTH POLE FUND

NEW YORK, Feb. 9.—The action of Commander Peary in contributing to the South Pole expedition the check for \$10,000 given him by Governor Hughes on behalf of the people of New York, came as a great surprise to those who attended the meeting at the Metropolitan Opera House when the gift, Commander Peary said.

"This check, which you have presented to me as a testimonial of appreciation I will, with your permission, and that of the officers of the Civic Forum, contribute to a fund to equip an American South Pole expedition to compete with our British cousins in the race for the Pole, and I am sure I wish to be taken as the joint contributor of the cities of New York."

A steady rain is scheduled tonight to break through the fog that hung over the city all day. Cold, clear weather will set in tomorrow, according to the Weather Bureau's prediction.

By 10 o'clock a slight wind had set in. The big clouds of moisture were wafted across a high, but the fog in its path emerged almost as wet as if he had been in a rain storm. There is more moisture in the air today, officials at the Weather Bureau say, than has been recorded for some time.

When it clears tomorrow the East is likely to get a nip, if the cold wave, according to present indications, that is now sweeping the Northwest States. The temperature there today is well below zero.


