

EXPECT TO OCCUPY QUARTERS APRIL 1

Plans Progressing for Organization of Union Republican Club.

The Union Republican Club, which is being formed by the League of Republican State Clubs of the District, intends to occupy the quarters in I street northwest, formerly the home of the Pennsylvania club, about April 1.

The idea of forming this organization was received with considerable enthusiasm by the members of the executive committee of the league when they met last night in their quarters in the Corcoran Building. Every man present expressed himself as favoring the plan and professed his belief that the club would prove a great success.

Nearly 300 Signers.
More than 200 persons, all Republicans, and the majority of them entitled to vote, have signed an agreement to join the club, and the committee, which was appointed by President Snyder last night to arrange the details incident to organizing, believes that the club will have a membership of more than 300 when it is finally launched.

It is the intention of the league to take possession of the I street quarters on April 1 next, and to mark the opening with a large social function of some kind.

The committee charged with completing the arrangements for the organization consists of Edgar C. Snyder, chairman ex officio; T. Lincoln Townsend, chairman; H. P. Holden, John R. Berg, George L. Whitford, Gus A. Schmidt, John G. Capers, and W. E. Andrews.

Will Make Report.
This committee will meet at the Commercial Club tomorrow night to discuss its plans, and will report back to the league on the evening of March 23.

From the expressions of the members of the executive committee, last night, the annual supper of the league, to be held at the Arlington Hotel April 9 next, will be the most successful given by the league.

President Taft has accepted an invitation to be the guest of honor and to make an address. Other speakers will be Senator Lodge of Massachusetts, John A. Stewart, president of the League of Republican Clubs of New York; Representatives J. Hampton Moore of Pennsylvania, John J. Each of Wisconsin, William B. McKinley of Illinois, and Duncan McKinley of California. A number of other Senators and Representatives will attend.

One of the features planned for the entertainment of the diners is the singing of the Gridiron quartet.

CAPITOL'S PLANT NEAR COMPLETION

Machinery for Power House Now Undergoing Acceptance Tests.

Within a week the new million and a half dollar power house, built for the purpose of furnishing light and heat to the Capitol group of buildings, will be completed. Already the machinery is being given acceptance tests.

By the end of next week, it is announced that the lighting department of the new power house will be in operation. The heating department will be commissioned later. It will probably not be used until next fall as warm weather will approach before its machinery could be connected with the four big buildings.

In addition to the Capitol, the new power house will supply light and heat to the Library, and to the two Congressional office buildings. Tunnels have been bored between the power house and each of these buildings. These tunnels are avenues for pipe lines and are large enough to admit the passage of a man when walking erect.

With the completion of the power station, the heating and lighting apparatus of the four buildings will be dismantled and sold. This will eliminate the dirt and smoke nuisance. It will also provide large additional space for record storage in the basements of the group of buildings.

Superintendent Elliott Woods, of the Capitol, has supervised the construction of the power station. He has added this work to his other duties and he will have charge of the operation of the plant when it is delivered to the Government by the contractors.


DR. W. P. THIRKIELD


