NO ATTEMPT LIKELY TO APPLY THE GAG

Caucus Plan Opposed, But Full and Free Discussion Is Demanded.

Recently, there was talk of holding a caucus on this bill and others. President Taft made it plain he favored the plan.

This applies not alone to the railroad bill, but to other important measures. Many members feel that they do not want to be tied up by a caucus to support specific features of a bill.

Another plan is to limit the general debate, but to provide in a rule that the bill shall be the subject of debate by section and the fullest opportunity given for discussion of each specific proposition and for amendment.

Nobly anticipated that the Rules Committee is going to bring out a rule that will not be liberal. If it should, it would find itself up against the beginning of its career.

Will They Stay Tamed? The bent of mind among many members of the House is to pass a railroad bill and pass one that will stand the full test of public scrutiny.

Insurgents are remarking much on the changed atmosphere in the House. They say the backbone of the House Republican machine is broken.

FURTHER OBJECTION TO STATUE OF LEE

Forty Protests From Massachusetts Presented At One Time.

Protests against placing the Lee statue in the Capitol are coming in to Congress at a rate that is proving embarrassing for not a few of the members of the Senate and House.

Massachusetts has sent in a long list. A storm of them piled down on the Senate from the Bay State. Senator Lodge presented forty of them at one time. All were from G. A. R. posts of his State.

Intense bitterness marks some of the protests. Through practically all of them run objections to the Confederate emblem being in the capitol. As is well known, General Lee's statue in Statuary Hall represents him in the uniform of a Confederate general.

Some of the protesters characterize Lee as a deserter from the United States army. Others refer to him as a "traitor."

A studied and direct insult to every living ex-Confederate soldier and sailor and doubly so to the memory of those who gave their lives that the Union might be saved, is the way one of the protesters runs.

DEGREES CONFERRED ON TWO EDUCATORS Impressive Ceremony At Chapel of Immaculate Conception College.

Two Dominican professors, the Rev. V. F. O'Daniel and the Rev. M. A. Waldron, have received the degree of master of theology, a distinction which during the past twenty years has been conferred upon only three priests of the order in the United States.

The impressive ceremony by which the conferring of the degree is attended took place yesterday morning in the chapel of the college of the Immaculate Conception. Cardinal Gibbons came over from Baltimore to attend, and Most Rev. John J. Heenan, archbishop of Baltimore, acted as ex officio honor to Archbishop Falconio.
