

## DAPHNE AND APOLLO RENEW THEIR YOUTH

Smart Set Sees Spring Celebrated in Ancient Hellenic Style.

### FESTIVAL AT OAKS NOTABLE TRIUMPH

Producers and Actors Share in Success of "The Daphnephoria."

To see the coming of spring celebrated after the joyous manner of the ancient Greeks, several hundred of Washington's smart set gathered yesterday afternoon at "The Oaks," where Mrs. Barney and Mrs. Lucie Barber presented "The Daphnephoria," for the benefit of Neighborhood House.

In a perfect pastoral setting of trees, grass and sky, and to the accompaniment of stately music, modern youths and maidens essayed roles of high priests and priestesses of prayer and of the dance. Small boys and girls became satyrs and dryads, and once more Daphne and Apollo lived.

The Daphnephoria festival, held in the days of pagan Greece once every nine years in honor of Apollo, and to celebrate the return of the sun from its winter pilgrimage, took its name from the laurel or bay tree, which was always carried in solemn procession by the Greeks to Apollo's altar.

**Great Reads Prologue.**  
The program at the Oaks opened with a prologue, read by the eminent exponent of pastoral art, Ben Greet, in Greek costume. Then followed the lighting of the altar fires, the procession of white-robed and white-veiled girls led by Miss Gladys Hinckley. The scene closed with an interesting sun dance, done by Mrs. Barber to the accompaniment of a Greek ode.

The myth of Daphne and Apollo, danced by Mrs. Noyes and Mr. Stiles, of Boston, was preceded by Homer's Noble Story of Daphne and Apollo, read by Mr. Greet. The pagan spirit of joyous life and love, and the physical beauty of the old Greeks found expression in the work of Mrs. Noyes, who, with Mr. Stiles, will make her professional debut in London within the coming year.

**Dancing Is Applauded.**  
The dancing of Mr. Stiles received much applause. As a student of Greek art, and as director of the Boston School of Design, he is known to Washington lovers of art.

Miss Roberta Ames gave to the dance of a Greek maiden scattering flowers the charm of her youth and winsome personality, and won the hearts of her audience, and young Miss Kathleen

Dunkorst, as a faun, was both graceful and charming.  
The scene, Apollo and the Muses, in which Mrs. Roma Devonne Hemphill sang a hymn to Apollo, was one of the best on the program, and in its pictorial effectiveness suggested Guido Romano's painting.

Mrs. Fitzney, in her Narcissus dance, and also in the spring dance, received great applause, which was a tribute not only to her dancing, but to her work in the organization of the festival.

**Score Notable Triumph.**  
That she and Mrs. Barber should have been able to present so elaborate a program within three weeks after beginning the training of so large a cast was remarkable. Her executive and artistic ability, and her dramatic feeling, were evidenced throughout the program.

"The Daphnephoria," as given yesterday at The Oaks, was adapted from Mrs. Barber's "Pageant of the Tree," presented under her direction at the New Opera House in Boston last winter with great success, and which, following upon "The Pageant of the Tree," produced by her at the dedication of the New Boston Normal School, has made her a recognized authority on pageantry. Both Mrs. Noyes and Mr. Stiles have studied exclusively under Mrs. Barber, and the work of the group dancers on yesterday's program also reflected great credit upon her.

The Marine Band furnished the music.

Simon Wolf, minister to Egypt in 1881-82, and one of the best-known members of the executive committee of B'nai B'rith in Washington, has been confined to his bed for the past three days at the hotel in Atlantic City where he is stopping with Mrs. Wolf.

While Mr. Wolf is reported to be suffering only from a slight attack of indigestion, he was unable to attend the B'nai B'rith meeting which is now being held in Richmond, Va. It was stated at his Washington home that Mr. Wolf is rapidly recovering from the attack and will return to Washington Sunday or Monday.

## KING MANUEL SAILS UNDER HEAVY GUARD

Extreme Precautions Taken to Protect Life of Portugal's Ruler.

LONDON, May 24.—Hedged in on all sides by his guards and escort, Manuel II, the boy King of Portugal, left London today. King George and the Duke of Cornwall bade him farewell as he left by special train for Dover, where he took a steamer.

Extreme precautions were taken to guard the life of the young ruler, whose visit to England was made with much trepidation. The fear of meeting the fate of his father, King Carlos, and his brother, the crown prince, who were assassinated two years ago, kept Manuel in the background during the major part of his stay here for Edward's funeral.
