

DELEGATES REMAIN FOR CONFERENCES

Sunday School Methods Discussed at Four Simultaneous Meetings.

TEMPERANCE BRANCH AT WESLEY CHURCH

Missionary Session Opened With Dr. Joseph Clark, of Ohio, Presiding.

A great conference of Sunday school workers, following immediately upon the World's Sixth Sunday School Convention, opened this morning at four of the largest churches in the city.

The temperance conference opened at Wesley Memorial Church this morning. Prof. F. S. Goodrich, of Michigan, presiding.

The missionary conference opened at Wesley Church this morning. Dr. Joseph Clark, of Ohio, presiding.

At McKendree Methodist Church the main auditorium was taxed to its utmost capacity in order to accommodate the throng of Sunday school teachers who gathered to hear a discussion of the methods of teaching elementary and primary work in Sunday schools.

Representative Washington Gardner presided at the afternoon conference on temperance, and among the speakers was Dr. Wilbur Crafts, superintendent of the National Reform Bureau, of this city.

In another auditorium at Wesley Church the missionary conference opened this morning, with Dr. Joseph Clark, of Ohio, presiding.

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Confferences on teaching intermediate and senior departments of Sunday schools were held at the First Presbyterian Church. William C. Johnston, of Colorado, presided at the morning, and Dr. H. Nichols at the afternoon session, and among the speakers were Frank L. Brown, of New York; Eugene C. Foster, of Michigan; E. W. Thornton, of Ohio; S. F. Shattuck, of Wisconsin; W. C. Pearce, and Dr. I. E. Rexford, of Quebec.

Teacher Training. Methods of training teachers for Sunday school work were discussed at the First Presbyterian Church. At the afternoon session of this conference, Dr. E. Morris Ferguson, of Pennsylvania, advocated the co-operation of all departments.

Downey, of Illinois, at the morning session, outlined a plan for the training of Sunday School teachers through correspondence courses, and Mrs. W. E. Williams, of Maryland, spoke on the subject: "How May Graduates Arouse and Maintain Interest in Teacher Training?" Under the enthusiastic leadership of J. Shreve Durham, at Mt. Vernon Methodist Episcopal Church, methods of advancing Sunday school interest through home visitation was discussed, large audiences being present at both morning and afternoon sessions. The Rev. I. W. Williamson, of British Columbia; E. F. Wetstein, of Kentucky; Hugh Cork, of Illinois; Miss Dora Redding, of North Carolina, and the Rev. S. A. Dean delivered an address at the morning session.

MANY DELEGATES HERE FOR WEEK

Filled with zeal for the advancement of the Sunday school interests of the world, and enthusiastic over the results of the great Sunday school convention just closed here, hundreds of delegates will remain in Washington a week longer, in order to hold a series of workers' conferences at various churches of the city.

These teachers and workers will gather today and tomorrow to discuss more intimately even than they have done at any time during the convention, the problems of Sunday school work. The conferences will be held at McKendree M. E. Church, the First Presbyterian Church, Mt. Vernon Place M. E. Church, and Wesley Church. Tomorrow evening a great mass meeting of field workers will be held at Mt. Vernon Methodist Episcopal Church.

With songs of praise, and with all the enthusiasm which marked the opening of the convention, the gathering was brought to a close last night at Convention Hall, Geneva, Switzerland, was selected as the next meeting place of the World's Sunday School Association, which will be held there in 1912.

Dr. George W. Bailey, of Philadelphia, was last night installed as the new president of the association, and Dr. F. B. Meyer, of the retiring presidency, was thanked for the great work he has accomplished during his term of office for the upbuilding of Sunday school interests throughout the world.

Spectacular Tableau.

A spectacular feature of the closing session of the convention was the tableau, participated in by 100 small boys and girls, representing the congress of nations. Clad in costumes of every nation, and carrying the flags of all nations, these children marched down the length of the great auditorium singing "Onward, Christian Soldiers." As they mounted the platform, the lights in the building went out, and a great cross, illuminated by electricity, blazed over their heads.

The resolutions presented at the closing session of the convention and taken by the great, international gathering on all questions pertaining to church operations. These resolutions contained the liquor traffic that is being carried on in Christian countries; make a plea for the stricter observance of the Sabbath; urge that the Sunday schools make themselves more efficient in missionary instruction; and endorse the adult Bible class movement as a powerful stimulus in the spread of the Bible.

For Universal Peace. Dr. F. B. Meyer was instructed by the resolutions to inform the third Hague conference that this World's Sixth Sunday School Convention endorsed universal peace.

Thanks were expressed to the local committees, pastors, and churches for their co-operation toward the success of the convention; to the choir and its directors, Percy Foster and Prof. Excell; to the press, to the general public, to the police, and street railway men. Dr. Meyer and Dr. Bailey, the retiring and incoming presidents of the association, were also thanked for their splendid work.
