

WOMAN IS HONORED WITH YALE DEGREE

Jane Addams, Founder of Hull House, Made M. A. FIRST OF HER SEX THUS RECOGNIZED James J. Hill Made Doctor of Laws—Alumni Reception and Dinner.

NEW HAVEN, Conn., June 22.—The first woman to be honored by Yale received the degree of master of arts in connection with the 20th commencement at the famous university today.

Jane Addams, founder of Hull House, in Chicago, was the recipient and is conferring the honor which established a precedent in the history of the college. Prof. Perrin paid a glowing tribute to the work for humanity performed by Miss Addams.

"She has had a prophetic vision of what might be done," and militant courage, united with a high order of administrative social and political capacity in doing and getting it done," he said, "and the world at last realizes her worth."

Another noted person honored was James J. Hill, of the Great Northern railroad, made a doctor of laws, of whom Prof. Perrin said: "He is the last of the generation of wilderness conquerors. The men who interpreted the Constitution, fixed our foreign relations, framed the Monroe doctrine, and blazed all the great trails which determined the nation's future, may count him among their compeers."

Other degrees conferred were: Master of arts: Truman H. Newberry, former secretary of the Navy; Kenneth Cox, artist; Dr. William Bradley Coley, malignant disease specialist.

Doctor of science: Simon Flexner, director of the Rockefeller Institute for Medical Research; Thomas Burr Osborne, chemist of the Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station.

Doctor of letters: John Burroughs, naturalist.

Doctor of laws: Walter Francis Frear, chief justice and governor of Hawaii; Charles D. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution.

Doctor of divinity: Dr. W. M. Jacobus, president of the Hartford Theological Seminary.

The John Addison Porter prize of \$450 was won by William Smith Culbertson, of Emporia, Kan., with an essay on Alexander Hamilton.

This afternoon the alumni reception and dinner was held and this evening commencement will end with the president's reception.

His Helen Taft was on hand to see her brother, Robert A. Taft, son of the President, receive his diploma.

When his name was read out there was a cheer and considerable applause, which changed to a shout of glee when someone in the gallery shouted: "Hurrah for the crown prince!"

BLAIR FEELS CONFIDENT OF DEFEATING PEARRE

"If Warner Withdraws I Will Win," Is His Statement.

FIGHT IN THE SIXTH MARYLAND IS WARM

Incumbent's Opponent Fears Only Division of Strength—Wants Clear Field.

"If Warner will withdraw from the race and leave me a clear field, I will beat Colonel Pearre for Congress in the Sixth."

This is the conviction of Gist Blair, of Montgomery county. This is his own statement. He has surveyed the entire district, calculated closely upon his support and determined that only a division of the Pearre opposition, such as is threatened by the Warner campaign, will send the present Representative back to Washington for another term.

"Warner's vigorous campaign is going to be the principal factor in causing Colonel Pearre to be renominated, if he is renominated," says Mr. Blair. He means simply that the strength which Warner develops will be drawn from the Blair camp and not from the Pearre following.

This is explained by Mr. Blair. He says that the present indications in the district are that Pearre is holding six points strongly to Pearre's holding his own in Allegany and Garrett counties. These are the western counties of the district. In Montgomery, Frederick, and Washington counties there are enough votes to beat Pearre, provided they are not divided. These eastern counties are the ones that Blair looks to for support. These are also the counties that Warner is looking to.

East Against West

In other words, the eastern half will be arrayed against the western half of the district. If Warner stays in the fight to the end he will poll a great many votes in the territory in which Blair would otherwise expect to get almost solid support. This is how Warner is preparing to renominate Colonel Pearre, in Mr. Blair's judgment.

In any event the Silver Spring candidate is in a position to stay. He declares that he will not change his mind in that regard whatever Mr. Warner does. He does not think that Warner has a ghost of a show to win the nomination himself and thinks that if this could be impressed upon him, he might possibly retire in favor of some one who already has shown strength in the district.

Just the same, Mr. Blair gives the positive assurance that he will see the fight through. He has been ever since the Montgomery county so overwhelmingly won the fight to the end of the district. This was several weeks ago. At that time Blair got all but two votes at the meeting.

His an interesting platform upon which Blair is making his fight. He is not making Colonel Pearre's personality or even his record an issue. He and Pearre were warm personal friends. He is making his campaign upon the issue of renominating Washington to Maryland—the Sixth district of Maryland. Of course, he is not trying to actually repeal the act which ceded the District to the Government. What he wants to do is to encourage a closer relationship between the Capital and the great counties of the Sixth district.

Blair's Platform.

"If I am ever the Representative of the Sixth district in Congress," said Mr. Blair today, "I shall make it my business to claim Washington as the one big city in the territory which I represent. I shall encourage Washington people to go into my district and build their fine summer homes, instead of going to Virginia, as they are now doing. I shall encourage my people to make Washington their market. It ought to be, by all means. "Then too, I would try to bring the

city and country together by better roads. No better roads, at some indefinite period, but better roads now. I would demand for them better trolley service. I would urge in season and out of season that these trolley lines be extended to every part of the District accessible at all times. I would like to see Washington connected with Frederick, Hagerstown, and even with Cumberland, by trolley lines.

"I should stand for the Washington-Gettysburg boulevard. I should ask for better steam railway service. I should work for the development and betterment of the country homes and country life. I should work for all those intimate local interests that should be regarded as just as highly important as the matters of broader statesmanship. That is the kind of a platform I am going before my friends and neighbors with."

Well-Known Figure.

For a long time Mr. Blair has been prominent in party councils. He has been chairman of the Montgomery county State central committee for a great many years and has figured in party conventions for the past twenty years. Nearly everybody in the Sixth District either knows him or knows of him.

That this Montgomery county candidate will show strong in the primary, is the opinion of his friends here. They insist that if he had a clear field he would defeat Pearre hands down. They say that he is as popular a man personally as there is in the District and has probably as wide a personal acquaintance as Colonel Pearre himself. If Pearre is to be defeated, it is pointed out here, the opposition should stand together rather than divide and subdivide. It should rally around the strongest man in the race, according to Washington argument, and should not lose its force by lack of concentration.

Before it is over the Sixth District campaign is likely to be about the most interesting in the State of Maryland.

MRS. GORMAN DIES AFTER LONG ILLNESS

Widow of the Late Senator Passes Away at the Age of Seventy-three.

Mrs. Hannah T. Gorman, the aged widow of the late Senator Arthur Pue Gorman of Maryland, after a serious illness, which has afflicted her for months, is dead. She breathed her last at her home at Vermont avenue and L street at 7:30 o'clock last night. Mrs. Gorman's physicians caused it to be known a week ago that the end was but a matter of a few days. Last Saturday there was a noticeable change for the worse. On the night of that day death seemed imminent, but she was able to rally.

Although funeral arrangements have not been completed, it is probable that Mrs. Gorman will be buried at Oak Hill Cemetery by the side of her distinguished husband. In the home at the time of her death were Arthur P. Gorman, her son, and Mrs. Gorman; her five married daughters, their families and her sisters, Mrs. Hendricks, and Mrs. Salladay.

Mrs. Gorman's illness began shortly after the death of Senator Gorman on June 4, 1907. A surgical operation was performed last October in the hope of prolonging her life, but slight improvement resulted.

Hannah Gorman was a daughter of Dr. James Donagan, a prominent physician of Reading, Pa. She was married twice, her first husband being A. Jordan Swartz, also of Reading. They had one child, Mrs. T. Leigh Marriott, of Baltimore. Mrs. Gorman was seventy-three years of age.

Mrs. Gorman never cared to share the public attention paid to her distinguished husband, and centered her thoughts and action on her home. She was the mother of a large family, five girls and one son having been born. All are married. Mrs. Ralph Hill, Mrs. Stephen Gambrell, and Mrs. Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Maryland.

After the death of her husband Mrs. Gorman resided in Washington, at her home at Vermont avenue and L street northwest. The residence was built by Mrs. Gorman after her husband's death at a cost of \$20,000.

Mrs. Gorman had two sisters, Mrs. Kathleen Salladay, of Philadelphia, and Mrs. Christine Hendricks, of Washington.
