WOMAN LAWYER PLAYS ROLE OF PORTIA

PLAYERS AT BELASCO HAVE A NEW PORTIA

Miss Keith Wakeman, Practicing Lawyer, Plays Part of Her Prototype.

Miss Keith Wakeman, the new member of the Ben Greet Stock Company, made her first appearance with them here as Portia in "The Merchant of Venice" this week. It was this role which induced her to choose between two professions, the stage and law, and to ultimately adopt both.

Previous to her graduation from college in England, Miss Wakeman visited the portraiture of Portia by a famous actress, and at once decided to adopt the stage or law as a profession. Her parents, at the time overruling the stage, she was articled to a London solicitor, read law and finally passed the bar examinations.

Through a train of circumstances, Miss Wakeman was induced to join the famous Benson players especially to play Portia, because as a lawyer it was thought she would give additional realism to the role. So successful was she that many law books were thrown aside and the stage became her vocation. Later she came to America as a leading lady for E. S. Willard. She returned to England and joined the forces of the Ben Greet Players, coming back to this country as leading lady for this organization. Last season she occupied the same position with Otis Skinner.

Miss Wakeman had made all arrangements for an extended vacation for this summer, when the call from Mr. Greet came for her to join his Washington organization at the Belasco. It was agreed that her first appearance here should be as Portia, which has ever had a curious fascination for this gifted woman. As Portia it is said that Miss Wakeman brings to the famous court scene the vigorous, incisive manner of a real lawyer pleading a triumphant case, though underlying her characterization is the touch of femininity which makes her performance wholly delightful.

"The Merchant of Venice" with Elizabethan settings was favorably received by a large audience at the Belasco Theater last night despite the sultriness of the weather. Taken as a whole, the performance was very creditable, although Ben Greet's interpretation of Shylock and his interpolation of the lines is vastly different from those of Sothorn, whose Shylock was so well liked here. Shrewd and pitiless and absolutely practical, without the repulsiveness of Sothorn's Shylock is that of Mr. Greet. Except for the final exit of the money lender after his crushing denunciation and appeal in court through the eloquence and arguments of Portia, when Greet's Shylock does not seem quite enough subdued by the work of the company.

Miss Keith Wakeman was a most acceptable Portia. She easily carried off the second honors, as Nerissa. Miss Violet Vivian perhaps showed better understanding of the lines and a keener appreciation of the spirit of the play than any other member of the company. J. Sayer Crawley as Bassanio, A. Hyllon Allen as Gratiano, Robert Gray as Tubal and old Gobbo, Percival Seymour as Lancelot Gibbo, and George Vivian as Arragon were good. E. S. Pigott's Antonio was a very acceptable, as was the work of the remainder of the company, with the possible exception of A. S. McSweeney as Salario.

The play was given last night without intermission, this being made necessary because the first scene of the fifth act, which is generally omitted for the sake of time, was given. The same play will be given tonight. Tomorrow evening and Saturday matinee and nights "The Comedy of Errors" will be presented.
