right to play in the street—when the city provides no other playground. When the building department does not force owners to provide playgrounds in tenement or apartment house courts.

"What is to be done with these active youngsters? Are they to be shut up in pens, like cattle ready for shipment to the shambles?"

Favors Using School Yard.

"That is why I believe in throwing open schools and school yards to children and their parents when classes are not in session. Millions are spent on public school buildings which belong to the taxpayers, the voters, and their families. They ought to be used more than six out of twenty-four hours. They represent an investment so large that they should pay better returns.

"We ought to have supervised play in school yards outside school hours. School property is not to be abused, you understand. We ought to have athletic fields, gymnasiums, and lectures, clubs and wholesome entertainments when the class rooms are closed and areas in the school. The free lectures are a step in the right direction. We are broadening this work. The social centers installed by the department of education mark progress along this line.

"As far as possible when school houses, playgrounds and recreation centers are thrown open to children, their elders should be urged to join the various movements and agencies in the unification of the family, an important element in the city's moral health. But if this unification can not be secured at once, at least every city should provide supervised amusements in school yards, parks and recreation centers.

Too Much Brain Work.

"We've had too much school-room refinement. Don't misinterpret that phrase. I don't mean culture, manners, morals. I mean the refinement of the educational system itself. There have been too many ologies and isms, too many non-essentials. Too many things have been attempted.

"The brains of the children have been pushed too hard, too fast, to really grasp essentials. We want simpler courses of study. Most of the modern children are only taught a few keep abreast of the system, the rest are under water all the time. And remember the speed of the squadron after all the speed of the fastest ship.

Washington Politicians Say
President Hopes to Save
New York.

POSTMASTER'S VISIT HELD SIGNIFICANT

Effect of Empire State Squabble
on Congressional Campaign Feared.

In spite of frequent declarations from Beverly that the President has adopted an intransigent policy of not interfering in any State party fights, it is regarded in Washington as absolutely certain that Frank H. Hitchcock is at this time engaged, on direction from Mr. Taft, in trying to straighten out the tangle of Republicanism in New York.

The Postmaster General is in Beverly today, following his mysterious conference of Wednesday with Vice President Sherman and William Loeb, Jr., collector of the port of New York, at the Manhattan Hotel, in New York city.

It is believed by the politicians in Washington that Hitchcock has been given the task of trying to get the leaders of the party in New York to agree upon a candidate for the governorship, that he went to New York with that end in view, and that his return to Beverly today is for the purpose of reporting to Taft personally the result of his mission.

DITCH DEATH TRAP TO AUTO OCCUPANTS

One Killed, One Fatally
Hurt, and Others Injured in Fall.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—One man was killed, one fatally hurt, and two others seriously injured early today when an automobile pitched thirty feet into an excavation, pinning its occupants under it.

The accident happened near West Brighton, Staten Island. The failure to place a danger signal at the ditch caused the accident.

John D. Lange, insurance broker, was instantly killed. Carl Walz sustained a fracture of the skull and internal injuries, and Allison Zelus and John Smith were less seriously injured.
