## Increased Attendance May Mean More Teachers, Say Officials.

Teachers. From these teachers the pupils transferred for promotion received transfer slips, and within half an hour they had reported to their teachers for the coming semester.

The fact that no new text books were introduced last year to assist in the early start of work, under a rule adopted by the Board of Education no change is now made. Text books except every third year. The present year marks the third year for which the present books have been used. Consideration of new ones will, therefore, be made this winter.

The first consideration of changes, Superintendent Hurst said this morning, will take place at the February meeting of the Board of Education.

### No Boys At Normal.

At even 100 new pupils reported to the Normal School today. Among these was not a single male student, despite the efforts made last year to enlist the interest of male graduates of the high schools. The senior class numbers ninety-five.

Pupils at the high school promoted from last year's classes reported at 9 o'clock. Those transferred from the eighth grade to enter the first year were instructed to be on hand at 11 o'clock.

Western High School students found the addition to the building completed and ready for occupancy. Other improvements made during the vacation season include additions to school houses in Cherry Chase in Southeast Washington and to the Lovejoy colored school.

Twenty-four additional teachers have already been engaged. Officials are watching the first grades of the colored schools with interest for the reporting of pupils found during the summer campaign in the alleys.

### Innovation At Eastern.

An innovation at Eastern High School is the introduction of a course of commercial training. This is designed to relieve the crowded condition of Business High School, and to furnish pupils in the eastern section of the city the opportunity for a business training without a long trip across town.

If the plan proves successful at Eastern, a similar course may be introduced in the other high schools.

Twelve medical students, who work to prevent the spread of contagious diseases, will be assisted by four nurses, who will show pupils and their parents how to take care of the sick.

Two dentists to show pupils how to care for their teeth have been asked for by the Board of Education.

## NOT VACCINATED, BARRED BY SCHOOLS

The eight-year-old daughter of Charles Castle, armed with a certificate of admission obtained on Saturday, was today taken to school and refused admission when her father declined to allow her to be vaccinated.

This action will be the signal for the Anti-Vaccination Society of the District of Columbia to take the first legal step in a test case to determine the validity of the compulsory vaccination law.

Charles W. Darr, attorney for the vaccination station, took immediate steps for a hearing before the Board of Education.

In the meantime the supervising principal of the northwest division, in which the Castles live, will be asked to allow the child to attend school until some action is taken in order that her parents may not fall under the ban of the compulsory education act.

It is not likely the Board of Education will take any action in the matter in view of the present law.

"The child must be vaccinated," said P. M. Hughes, assistant superintendent of schools, this morning. "That is the law, and that ends the case as far as we are concerned."

"A fine legal point is involved in the controversy," said Attorney Darr. "If this child does not go to school, her parents may be arrested under the terms of the compulsory education act. If she does, she must be vaccinated, contrary to the wishes of her parents. Now, the compulsory act says nothing about vaccination, save, of course, by implication, when it states pupils must meet the law's requirements. But when it comes to inoculating a child with a virulent disease it seems there is some doubt about the validity of the requirement."

If the Board of Education refuses to act, Mr. Darr said, the parents would be asked allowing the child to attend school until the Supreme Court of the District made some ruling on the matter.

## OFFICIALS INSPECT NEW SCHOOL HOUSES

### Strong John Thompson and Monroe Buildings and Two Engine Houses Visited.

Preliminary to their formal acceptance from the contractors, the Commissioners today inspected the Strong John Thompson school building at Twelfth and L streets northwest, the Monroe school building in Columbia road, between Sherman and Georgia avenues, No. 2 engine houses, in Twelfth street, near G street northwest, and No. 23 engine house in G street, between Twelfth and second and twenty-third streets northwest.

Both school buildings were occupied today for the first time. The engine houses will be opened in about three weeks.

## WITNESSES CALLED IN LORIMER INQUIRY

CHICAGO, Sept. 19.—The subcommittee of the United States Senate on Privileges and Elections, which will begin its investigation into the election of Senator William Lorimer in Chicago tomorrow, probably will have the final say regarding the alleged Illinois "black-bag" scandal.

Practically every one who testified in either of the trials of L. O'Neil Browne, who several days ago was acquitted of a charge of bribery in connection with Lorimer's election, will be called to the witness stand.

They will have to tell the truth because perjury in Federal cases means prison sentences, without much chance of escape. No witness, also, may refuse to testify on the ground that his testimony might convict him.

Twenty or more subpoenas were issued and served today. It was rumored that the members of the committee would demand to cross-examine Senator Lorimer himself.

## LODGE MAY CANCEL SPEAKING SCHEDULE

BOSTON, Sept. 19.—Senator Henry Cabot Lodge may have to cancel his speaking engagements in the coming campaign because of ill health.

It was learned today that at a reception at Norwood Saturday Senator Lodge, after making his speech, fainted. He had just strength enough to leave the piazza and enter the dining room of the Cushing House, when he collapsed. A physician was summoned, but by the time of his arrival the Senator had recovered.

## TO STUDY ABROAD.

Dr. E. P. Magruder, superintendent of Emergency Hospital, will leave Wednesday for an extended trip abroad, sailing by the Mauretania from New York to Liverpool. Dr. Magruder will take a course in operative surgery at the University of Vienna, and will visit the noted hospitals of Edinburgh, London, Paris, and Berlin.


