

Impressive Ceremony Marks the Marriage Of Miss Eleanor Terry to Lt. Filippo Camperio

St. Thomas' Church Scene of Beautiful International Wedding.

St. Thomas' Episcopal Church was the scene of a beautiful wedding of international interest today at noon, when Miss Eleanor Terry, daughter of Rear Admiral Silas W. Terry, U. S. N., retired, and Mrs. Terry, became the wife of Lieut. Filippo Camperio, Italian Royal Navy, formerly naval attaché of the Italian embassy in Washington.

The church was effectively decorated for the occasion with a simple, artistic arrangement of palms, smilax and white chrysanthemums. The chancel was banked with tall palms, the altar vases were filled with the white chrysanthemums, and the pews reserved for the families were marked off with standards of the white chrysanthemums.

An elaborate musical program preceded the entrance of the bridal party. Mr. Aldrich, the organist of the church, gave a recital of appropriate selections during the seating of the guests and Mrs. A. T. Freeman, formerly Miss Grace McCullough, a school friend of the bride, sang a beautiful solo. The vested choir sang the "Bridal Chorus," from "Lohengrin," during the bridal procession, and "O, Perfect Love," during the ceremony.

The bride, who was escorted and given in marriage by her father, Admiral Terry, wore a beautiful bridal gown of rich ivory satin with a full, court train.

The bodice, which was entirely of old point applique lace, belonging to the bride's mother, was draped in a fichu of satin, embroidered in pearls, and the skirt was draped in chiffon in pannier effect. The girdle, of soft satin and chiffon, was caught at the left side with a chou of chiffon and a spray of orange blossoms.

Bridal Veil
Family Heirloom.
Her bridal veil, which was held in place with a wreath of orange blossoms, was of rare old Italian lace about 150 years old, an heirloom in the bridegroom's family, and sent to Miss Terry by the bridegroom's mother, Mme. Camperio, for the occasion.

The bride of today is the sixth bride in the family to have been married wearing the veil.

The bridal bouquet was a shower of bride roses and lilies of the valley, and her ornaments were a magnificent string of pearls, the gift of the bridegroom's mother, and two handsome diamond pendants, the gift of the bridegroom, both heirlooms in his family.

Mrs. Carlos Cusach, of Annapolis, a cousin of the bride, was the matron, and the bride's only attendant. Her gown was of soft white crepe and chiffon, and she wore a large black picture hat trimmed with a long plume, and carried a cluster of bridesmaid roses.

Maribee Negretto, the new consul of the Italian embassy, acted as best man for Lieutenant Camperio. The ushers who seated the guests and led the bridal procession were Brig. Gen. Clarence R. Edwards, U. S. A.; Maj. W. V. Judson, U. S. A.; Lieut. Commander Newton A. McCarty, U. S. N.; Capt. Archibald W. Butt, U. S. A.; Dr. Raymond Spear, U. S. N.; Harry Day and Ralph Bloomer, of the new Italian embassy; and Lieut. Commander Pfister, naval attaché; Roberto Centaro and Augusto Rosso, of the Italian embassy.

After the ceremony at the church, a reception and breakfast for about 250 guests was served at the Rauscher A. string orchestra played throughout the reception, and the ball room suite was prettily decorated with palms, white chrysanthemums and white roses. A large centerpiece of lilies of the valley and white roses adorned the bride's table.

Mrs. Terry, mother of the bride, who assisted in receiving the guests, was handsomely gowned in black velvet trimmed with touches of rose point lace, with a large black hat trimmed with white plumes.

Lieutenant and Mme. Camperio left Washington later in the afternoon for New York, where they will spend several days before sailing December 10 for Italy. They will go first to Milan, where they will spend Christmas with the bridegroom's mother, and later will go to Venice, where the bridegroom is stationed. Mme. Camperio traveled in a tailored suit of dark blue cloth with a turban, muff and collar of ermine and seal skin.

The bride of today is one of the most attractive and popular young women of Washington society. She made her debut at the Washington Navy Yard, where her father was commandant of the yard for years, before his retirement from the service, and since then has been an acknowledged belle. Since the announcement of their marriage to the young diplomat, they have been showered with social attentions. Their departure from Washington is a matter of regret.
