STARVED AND BEATEN ON AN OYSTER SLOOP

Harrowing Tale of Brutal Treatment, of Hunger, and Imprisonment on Boat Told By Young Virginian In Police Court—Not Shanghaied, He Says.

Blue lipped, his hands cut and bleeding from the effects of the ice cold salt water in which he had worked for weeks, and his feet frostbitten, Walter Haley, a young white man from Richmond, Va., staggered into the Police Court this morning to seek warmth and shelter.

Not Kidnaped.

"No, I wasn't kidnaped or anything of that kind," said he in response to a question from the probation officer. "I went of my own free will, and that's what made it all the harder afterward when I couldn't get away."

"I raised \$500 a couple of years ago and sent two captains to jail for eighteen years apiece, and I think it's about time was started another crusade of the same kind."

"Then when it came to clothes, all we got were taken out of our wages—\$2 a month—most of which we never got, and they wouldn't give us any boots, only these old things. 


