White, a retired Baptist minister, at his home. The bride and groom gave their ages as eighteen and twenty-one, respectively. They returned to Frederick last evening.

### FORGETFUL BRIDE FORGIVES HUSBAND

Woman Who Couldn't Remember Her Wedding Drops Suit.

Within twenty-four hours after she had filed a suit for annulment of her marriage, in which she charged her husband, George Weaver, with having drugged her with candy, and then marrying her when she was in a state of coma, Mrs. Catherine Sonnemann-Weaver, daughter of William F. Sonnemann, 113 Second street northwest, today said she would ask her husband to return to her.

Mrs. Weaver said she would take immediate steps to withdraw the court proceedings for annulment that were instituted yesterday in the District Supreme Court through her attorney, W. A. Coombe.

"I am sorry now I instituted proceedings," said the twenty-two-year-old bride. "I do not know why I took court action, because I love my husband and will telegraph him to come back to me today. He is living in a nearby city and will return to me and give me a home, for I know he loves me."

Mrs. Weaver said she had known Weaver only two days before they were married. He was boarding at their home, she said, and asked her to take a car ride. After she had eaten some candy he gave her, she said, she remembered nothing for two days, when she learned she had been married at Rockville by the Rev. Dr. Packard.

Dr. Packard said today he remembered distinctly marrying the couple. He said the girl, as far as he observed, appeared to be in full possession of her faculties. His statement was corroborated by two members of his family who acted as witnesses.

### Lady Maccabees To Organize New Club


