

DISTRICT'S OLDEST TEACHER SOON TO TAKE YEAR'S REST

Mrs. Laura Bradley, in Service Fifty-three Years, to Ask Leave.

Mrs. Laura Bradley, the oldest teacher in point of service in the Washington schools, is about to ask the Board of Education for a year's leave of absence. This retirement from service may mark the permanent quitting of the service by Mrs. Bradley.

For fifty-three years Mrs. Bradley has been a teacher here, spending the greater part of that time in work among the Georgetown schools, where hundreds of boys, many of them now prominent business and professional men, were trained by her. For the past few years she was teacher of the seventh grade at the Taylor School, Seventh and G streets northeast, and previous to that she was principal of the Jackson School. She also had charge at the Jefferson for a number of years. High tribute was paid her today by school officials.

"Mrs. Bradley is not only at the top of the record in point of service, but she is pretty near the high mark in actual accomplishment," said A. T. Stuart. "She is beloved by pupils and by parents in the communities where she has taught, and few persons connected with the school system have cast a more far-reaching influence."

Mrs. Bradley is modest and retiring, and when seen at her apartments, 1300 Massachusetts avenue, refused to talk about her career, and begged that no mention of her retirement be made.

Police Fail to Find Thomas Jewel Thief

The police today failed to get any clue to the identity of the thief who ransacked the home of John R. Thomas, a clerk in the Patent Office, at 123 Belmont street northwest, and stole jewelry valued at about \$200. Among the articles taken were Mrs. Thomas' engagement and wedding rings and a gold watch, which were in a bag in a trunk in the attic.

The robbery occurred yesterday afternoon during the absence of members of the family. When Mr. Thomas returned home shortly after 5 o'clock he found the contents of the trunk missing, and about the floor. The thief had gone through everything in the house. Entrance was gained through a cellar window and climbing up the dumbwaiter shaft to the first floor.

Several other robberies are being investigated by the police today. The Star lunch room, 1319 G street northwest, was entered last night by forcing the rear door and \$39.70 stolen from the cash register.

While Mrs. Harry Van Dusen, of 3132 O street northwest, was away from home yesterday afternoon, a thief entered by removing a screen from a first-floor window and stole \$30 worth of wearing apparel.

Parents Go to Daughter Who Eloped on Monday

Mr. and Mrs. Meyer, the parents of young Mrs. Spruwes, who eloped to Atlantic City on Monday, have joined her at Atlantic City. They have no criticism to make, but think they should have waited for a church wedding, which Mrs. Meyer had planned for her daughter when she decided to wed.

Escaped Soldier Returns to Home

Michael Kolasinski, who escaped from the Soldiers' Home Hospital about a month ago, when he had been held under observation for insanity, returned to the home yesterday, of his own accord. He was at once placed in the guard house, where he will be held until his transfer to the Washington Asylum. He gave no reason for leaving.

Exploded Shell Enters Boy's Hip

As the result of an experiment which he tried at Fifteenth and A streets southeast yesterday afternoon, thirteen-year-old James Jeffries, colored, 517 Ricketts court northwest, is in Casualty Hospital today, with a bullet wound in his left hip. His condition is not serious.

James found a cartridge in the street, and laying it on the pavement, dropped a brick on it. The shell exploded, the bullet entering his hip.

Two Boys Are Bitten By Dogs Near Homes

Two boys were bitten by dogs yesterday, according to reports made to the police.

Arthur Sussan, eleven years old, of 603 I street northeast, was bitten on the left arm while playing with a neighbor's dog near his home, and Elmer sixty feet while working on the new bit on the hand while in front of his home, 170 Benning road. Both boys had their wounds cauterized.

RECHABITES WILL HAVE CONCERT AT SESSION TODAY

Committees on Law, Finance, and State of Order to Report.

A banquet, followed by a concert by members of the order, will be the main event of the second day of the fifty-ninth session of the High Tent of the Independent Order of Rechabites, which is being held at Pythian Temple.

The delegates are now all seated, and the roster is complete, embracing representatives from nearly every State. Today will be given over to the reports of the committees on law, finance, and state of the order. The law committee will recommend several changes, notably the right of referendum, which will give the several chapters a chance to express their sentiment regarding matters which are to come before the High Tent.

Last night the delegates were the guests of Jehu Tent, No. 23, at which place the new ritual was exemplified. Tomorrow will be taken up with the election of officers, and the designation of a place for meeting next year. There are several cities bidding for the convention, and the probable place is in much doubt today.

Ruler Williams Explains.
High Chief Ruler Williams, of this city, is much pleased with the work of the order during the past year, and is satisfied that an effective fight is being carried on by its members against liquor. "I was evidently misunderstood as to my remarks about President Taft and the Emperor of Germany," said Mr. Williams today. "I did not say that these men were total abstainers. What I did wish to convey was that they have taken a stand against drinking alcoholic beverages in public places and at public banquets, and the whole world applauds the stand they have taken. The Emperor of Germany has severely criticized the officers of the German army for their drinking, and this shows that the cause of temperance is gaining favor."

Established in England.
The order of Rechabites was established in Salford, England, in 1835, and the first chapter in the United States was formed in New York city in 1842, by Captain Turner.

"The name and precepts of the order are taken from the Thirty-fifth chapter of Jeremiah, and the modern Rechabites are carrying out the precepts and examples of the ancient tribe, and are doing a grand and noble work for the uplift of mankind."

Our main object is for temperance, and the curtailing of the liquor traffic. We do not work from a public standpoint, although in favor of no license. What we believe in is to defeat liquor by bringing individuals into the order who are addicted to the use of alcohol, and to correct this fault in them for the better condition of God, home and native land.

"Also we have benefit funds for the sick, and death benefits as an encouragement and inducement to keep the members in the order."






