

SPECIAL AUDITOR FOR MRS. HUTCHINS' DEBTS NOW ASKED

Objection to Paris Bills of Millionaire's Wife Also Filed.

Recommendation that the unpaid bills presented by Mrs. Rose Keeling Hutchins, wife of Stilson Hutchins, whose \$2,000,000 estate is in litigation, be referred to a special auditor, was made to the District Supreme Court by Nathaniel Wilson, guardian ad litem for the millionaire. He said it would be "impracticable to agree to a settlement."

It developed from the claims presented that Dr. E. E. Jelliffe, the New York alienist, has examined Mr. Hutchins as to his mental condition within the last few weeks. He has a claim of \$1,000, and trustee William J. Dante objects to its payment, saying it is "clearly unquestionable, inasmuch as it goes to confirm the diagnosis made by Dr. W. G. Morgan and Z. T. Sowers, who allege the millionaire is insane."

Objection is also made to payment of the Paris bills presented by Mrs. Hutchins, it being held that they should be paid out of her personal allowance of \$2,000 a month and not out of the estate.

One bill is for pew rental amounting to \$65, presented by Epiphany Church, and next following is an account of \$24.75 for hats by Fleming. Includes among the bills is one of \$1,000 loaned by Attorneys Gittings and Chamberlain to Mrs. Hutchins. Also there is an item of \$412.50 by Berry & Whitmore for a pin, which Mrs. Hutchins says was a Christmas present from her husband last year.

Police Nab Thief Before Victims Report Robbery

Accused of breaking into the home of John W. Souder, 1228 Randolph street northeast, and stealing jewelry valued at \$100, a man who said he was James Haslam, twenty-eight years old, of 128 D street northeast, was arrested today by Detective Harry Evans, of the Sixth precinct.

An unusual feature in connection with the case is the fact that the arrest was made and the articles recovered before any report of the theft had been made to the police. Detective Evans learned that a man was trying to dispose of jewelry in New Jersey avenue this morning at ridiculously low prices. He placed the man under arrest. Nearly \$100 worth of jewelry was found in his possession. Haslam, the police assert, told them he had gotten it in the Souder home.

ALEXANDRIA BODY DOES ILLEGAL ACT

Council Appropriation on Annexation Matter Not Within the Rules—Delegation to Attend Pastor's Funeral in Baltimore.

WASHINGTON TIMES BUREAU. ALEXANDRIA, VA., DEC. 1. After a conference with Corporation Attorney Samuel P. Fisher, today, Hubert Snowden, president of the common council, announced that the action in passing Councilman Williams' resolution at Tuesday's meeting, was in violation of the rules, and, accordingly, illegal.

The resolution was presented at the climax of a discussion on the annexation question, when Williams presented a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee of four members, whose duty it would be to investigate conditions in at least three Virginia cities where annexation has been successful, and report. This carried an appropriation of \$300, and was passed by a vote of 10 to 6. Under the rules, no appropriation for a sum in excess of \$100 can be made on the night on which the resolution is offered.

Mr. Snowden probably will assemble the council in special session within a week, when the resolution will be put through under the rules.

Funeral services for the Rev. W. M. Poisal, pastor of the Bethany Methodist Protestant Church, who died suddenly in Baltimore yesterday afternoon, will be held from his residence in that city tomorrow afternoon. A large delegation from this city will attend.

Mr. Poisal had been pastor of Bethany Church since 1907. On November 7 he was attacked with cerebral hemorrhage. Realizing he probably would not be able to return to his pastorate, he addressed a letter of resignation to his congregation. He was seventy-two years old and is survived by a wife and two children.

As to the income tax, the President says he didn't want it in the 1909 tariff bill because, among other things, he

did not want the dignity of the Supreme Court offended by being required to pass again on an act it once had rejected. To this the reply was made today by a prominent insurgent that during his campaign for the Presidency Mr. Taft was much less concerned about the court's dignity, for he declared in one speech that he was for an income tax, and believed that "as now constituted," the court would approve such a measure.

One interesting feature in this connection is that the President tells how he originated the corporation tax idea and forced it on Senator Aldrich. It has commonly been understood that the Aldrich-Rule forces in control of the Senate at that time originated this provision, and secured the President's assent to it.


