COMMITTEE FAVORS LABOR DEPARTMENT

Bill Creating New Executive Bureau To Be Reported.

The creation of a Department of Labor as a separate Government department, having as its head a member of the Cabinet, is to be recommended by the House Committee on Labor. It was learned today that the committee has practically determined to report favorably a bill introduced by Congressman Sulzer of New York providing for the creation of another executive department of the Government.

Senate Calls for Automobile Inquiry

Senator Bristow of Kansas, who when the District appropriation bill was under consideration, objected to the way Government officials were covering up about the automobile accident by the Government, followed up his objections made at that time by getting the Senate yesterday afternoon to adopt a series of resolutions calling on the heads of departments, the Commissioners, the Government Printing Office, the Smithsonian Institution, and the Civil Service Commission, to submit to the Senate a report of the vehicles used by them.

Complainants Ask Court for Clemency

Harold O. Sparks, aged seventeen, pleaded guilty to securing money by representing himself as collector for newspapers, and was paroled in United States branch of Police Court today. Four counts of larceny, totaling \$8.62 were charged against him. Attorney Robert J. Miller, counsel for the boy, reported that restitution had been made. Assistant United States Attorney Ralph W. C. Hays, who is prosecuting the case, desired that clemency be extended. Judge James L. Pugh sentenced Sparks to 120 days in jail, with each of his four counts and placed him on probation for a year.

Former Mayor Will Appeal Court Edict

Louis C. Witowski, former mayor of the town of Glen Echo, Md., intends to appeal from the decision of the circuit court at Rockville on Saturday, which refused to give him, as informer, half of \$600 in fines imposed by the circuit court of the Sunday law at Glen Echo last summer.
