

ODD FELLOWS PLAN TO CELEBRATE NEXT FRIDAY NIGHT

Anacostia Lodge to Join Observance of Ninety-third Anniversary.

WASHINGTON TIMES BUREAU, ANACOSTIA, D. C., APRIL 19. Salem Lodge, No. 22, Independent Order of Odd Fellows, last night received satisfactory reports concerning the progress that is being made with plans for the celebration of the ninety-third anniversary of the establishment of the order one week from tonight by all the District lodges.

The seventeen subordinate lodges of the order in the District, the four encampments, and the Odd Fellows Hall, in Seventh street northwest, at 8 o'clock next Friday night to observe the anniversary. A literary and musical program is being provided, and Congressman George W. Norris of Nebraska, who is a past grand master and past grand representative of the order, will deliver the principal address.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows was organized first in the United States in 1817 at Baltimore, Md., and it was the offshoot of the order then long existing in England, known as the Manchester Unity. The order in the District, but will be universal in the world according to the mandate of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in Washington. The 2,900 people are affiliated with the different lodges. Statistics of the order show that it has about 1,900,000 members in America.

A miniature cloudburst in the Anacostia section of the District yesterday afternoon was accompanied by an electrical disturbance and a hailstorm. The hail fell for half an hour, and the stones were likened in size to marbles. Lightning flashed vividly, and a large silver poplar tree on the Frederick Douglass estate, at W and Thirtieth streets, was struck and was splintered from top to bottom. The bolt arched from the people in the neighborhood. Some telegraph wires on the street were struck and hurled about. At the same time there was a terrific downpour. It was feared that the hailstorm would cause injury to growing crops in the gardens hereabouts, but reports this morning indicated that in the opinion of the truck gardeners they had suffered no damage. It is believed the fall of hail and the storm, which was much severer in the adjacent portions of Prince George county, Md.

The marriage of Miss Sarah Cross, of southeast Washington and Riggles Griffith, an attaché of the Government Hospital for the Insane, took place last evening at 8 o'clock in the Anacostia Baptist Church, where the Rev. Frank L. Bardens, the pastor, performed the ceremony. The wedding was a quiet one, and immediately afterward Mr. and Mrs. Griffith went to their future home in Congress Heights.

The first quarterly conference of the official board of the Anacostia Methodist Episcopal church, following the annual meeting of the Baltimore conference, was held last night in the church at the conclusion of the mid-week service. The Rev. John W. R. Sunwalt, the District superintendent, came over from Washington to preside. Routine business only was transacted.

A feature of the session of the Men's Club of the Esther Memorial P. M. E. church, at the residence of Milton J. Phillips, in Nichols avenue, was the lecture delivered by the Rev. Willard G. Davenport, the rector of the Emmanuel P. E. Church, in Anacostia, in explanation of the principles of the temperance movement, the reasons for success or failure, and a plea for a spirit of broad-minded work. Those who took part in the program were Charles A. Stevens, Gordon Darling, and Milton J. Phillips.

The Rev. Samuel W. Grafflin, the pastor of the Anacostia M. E. Church, will tonight deliver his lecture on "The End of the Rainbow" before the members of the North Carolina M. E. Church, in Washington. The Rev. Mr. Grafflin gave the same lecture in Trinity M. E. Church on Tuesday night, and on Wednesday night he spoke on "A Bunch of Keys" in the Petworth M. E. Church.

MEMORIAL SERVICE FOR MAJ. BUTT TO BE HELD MAY 5TH

President and Senators Pay High Tributes to Dead Hero.

Memorial services for Major Archibald Butt, whose name is one of the most prominent among the Titanic's heroic dead, will be held in this city on May 5 under the auspices of Temple Lodge, the Masonic organization of which the late military aide to the President was a member. This will be the most elaborate plans are being made for the event, and not only the President, but the most prominent officials of the Capitol and of the Masonic order, will be present.

The service will be an open one, and among the notables who have been invited as speakers are Col. Henry Waterson, of Kentucky, and Senator Bacon of Georgia.

Memorial services for Major Butt will also be held in Augusta, Ga., and will be a general service and will be open to all the residents, as will also be the one in Washington, Augusta was Major Butt's home. The President will try to attend this service also.

All flags were flown at half-mast at the White House, the State War, and Navy building, and all other public buildings in Major Butt's memory today. Among the callers on the President today there was not one but who regretted the untimely fate of the popular military aide a senator. Augustus O. Bacon of Georgia said:

"I've known Major Archibald Butt from his very early manhood, and he was one of the best of characters and the most loyal of friends. I doubt if there was a man in the United States who had more friends than he. He was almost like that of a brother. He was a very rare character and we shall not see his like again."

Senator Tillman President: "Just to say a good word for poor Archie Butt," as he expressed it.

"Major Butt was one of God's gentlemen," said Senator Tillman. "I knew him for some years and he was a splendid example of American manhood."

"No man grieves more for Major Butt than I do," said Senator Bailey of Texas. "I became acquainted with him twenty years ago and I always knew him as a fine type of gentleman. His death is a great loss to the country."

Senator Crane of Massachusetts said at the White House: "Major Butt's death is one of the saddest things I have ever heard of. It is a frightful thing."

ISMAY CONDEMNED FOR TAKING BOAT

Daughter of Congressman Hughes Tells of Experience in Sea Disaster.

NEW YORK, April 18.—Not only did J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the White Star line, get into one of the first lifeboats to be launched, but he was escorted and assisted by several seamen, while the women had to tumble in and take care of themselves, according to Mrs. Lucien P. Smith, daughter of Congressman Hughes of West Virginia, and widowed bride of Lucien P. Smith.

Mrs. Smith told her experience through her uncle, Dr. J. H. Vincent, of Huntington, W. Va. "Captain Smith was standing beside the boat when it was lowered. Mrs. Smith implored Captain Smith, who was standing nearby, to permit her husband in the boat, but he refused. There were but twenty persons in the boat, having a capacity of fifty to sixty, when it was lowered. Many more might have been saved in this boat and there was but one drunken sailor aboard to man it. The women had to row it as best they could. In the face of all this Captain Smith refused the pleading of Mrs. Smith to let her husband in the boat."

STEWART ON RESCUE BOAT TELLS STORY

Robert Cole Says Carpathia Was Sixty-two Miles Away When Boat Went Down.

Robert Cole, a steward on the rescue ship Carpathia, stated that the Carpathia was sixty-two miles away when she received the Titanic's first wireless signal of distress. "When we got that message for help," he said, "the course of the Carpathia was immediately altered and we rushed to the aid of the foundering liner at the rate of seventeen and one-half knots an hour."

"We began to see signs of ice and at about dawn we sighted the boats. Over the spot where the Titanic went down were floating a little wood and wreckage. "The first boat contained only thirteen passengers. In others there were anywhere from twenty to sixty."

"Many of those we pulled aboard had their hands and feet frozen, some were unconscious and were lying in the bottom of the boats. Others raved like madmen; some wept, and still more were just dumb."

"One woman held an infant in her arms which had been frozen to death. In another boat a man in a nightdress was lying dead. The ship's hospital was soon filled with the sufferers who moaned out their sorrow and pain and just lay like dead things."

GUARD RECRUITS WILL LEAVE TO ENLIST EARLY

No Pay During Encampment For Less Than Three Months' Men.

National Guard recruits enlisting to go to the annual encampment will not receive full service pay from the Government unless they have at least three months' service prior to the time their organization leaves for the joint maneuver camp. This provision is made in section 590 of the militia regulations, but has just been republished for the benefit of militia officers. Payment for active service with less than three months' experience cannot be made from any Federal appropriation or State allotment.

It has been the custom in Washington for years to build up the National Guard enrollment with the prospects of an outbreak of rebellion, not only at Government expense, but on Government pay. In the future those who wish to go to camp will have to enlist early.

If payments are made to troops from private or State sources with the hope of encouraging them to enlist, the officers responsible for the payments will lose the funds so advanced, because the expenditure will not be allowed by the Government.
