Police Trying to Find Out What Became of Funds of William Koelkel, of Cumberland.

The police today are endeavoring to learn what disposition William F. Koelkel, a Cumberland, Md., brewer agent, who ended his life yesterday by slashing his throat with a razor in a Pennsylvania avenue hotel, made of \$500 which he is said to have had in his possession when he left Piedmont, Va., for Washington Monday morning.

Henry J. Koelkel, a brother of Cumberland, arrived in Washington today and made arrangements for taking the body to Westport, Md., for interment. Besides two brothers, Koelkel is survived by a wife and one child, who live in Westport.

Koelkel arrived in Washington Monday afternoon, but did not go to the Commercial Hotel, where he ended his life, until midnight that night. The fact the man's money was gone lent an element of mystery to the case, but both the police and the coroner say it was a clear case of suicide.
