LOCAL MARKET AT STEADY PRICES

Railway Common Easier at 89—Bonds Slow—Bank Stocks Firm.

Today's local market was not worthy of much comment. It was slow from start to finish, and the call required no longer time than necessary to repeat the quotations of yesterday on the inactive stocks and practically on the leaders as well.

Railways common was the leader, if a stock in which but seventy-five shares changes hands is worthy of this dignity of being so designated. The price was \$9, a little lower than on Friday. The preferred sold in a small way at \$49.94.

Small lots of other stocks changed hands, none requiring comment.

President Scott, of the Continental Trust Company, was at his desk today, having just returned from Russia. Incidentally the result of his visit will be the liquidation of this bank of an estate worth nearly a million dollars, and a speedy addition of \$400,000 to the funds of the institution.

The Mercantile Bank successor to the Provident Savings Bank, ended its career today, being absorbed by the Union Savings Bank, which assumed all assets and liabilities and will pay off the shareholders of the Mercantile on the basis of par or 100 cents.

Senator Scott, president of the Continental Trust Company, returned from Russia with Mrs. Scott today. He was accompanied by his daughter, and is taking over for the trust company of the estate of Enoch Emery.

EXPECTS CONGRESS TO PASS MEASURE ON PARCELS POST

Powerful Support Is Said to Be Rallying to Bourne Bill.

That Congress is likely to enact sweeping parcels post legislation at this session was learned today. Powerful support is rallying to the Bourne bill for a parcels post on the same system. It was declared today that the Senate and that once it has passed the Senate the House will probably put it through.

The low rate of 5 cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional pound, for local and rural route delivery, is expected to build up a large amount of new business in the postal service, advantageous to local business houses and profitable to the Government.
