Your dress may be bleached white by soaking it over night in strong soap suds, then boiling it in javelle water made as follows: One-half gallon of boiling water poured over a half pound of chloride of lime. Fill a boiler half full of water and add the javelle water, dip the dress up and down in this for some time, bleaching it evenly, then rinse in three waters. Keep this preparation away from the children.

William Rockefeller Is 71 Years Old Today

William Rockefeller, the American capitalist and brother of John D. Rockefeller, is seventy-one years old today. Mr. Rockefeller was born at Richford, Tioga county, N. Y., May 31, 1841. He began his business career as a bookkeeper in a hardware store in a produce commission business. Shortly afterwards he became identified with his brother's business, and has since been head of the business in New York since 1865. Since the operation of the Supreme Court decision decree he has been president of the Standard Oil Company of New York.


