

FIGHT TO THE END AGAINST THIEVERY, ROOSEVELT'S ORDER

Says His Nomination Is Secondary to Cleaning Up Convention.

than enough to nominate a candidate for President.

On the fact of this vote Taft is defeated. Mr. Roosevelt is not yet nominated, but will be. Taft can lose only nineteen votes; Roosevelt must gain three or four times that many. But Taft seems certain to lose some, Roosevelt certain to win some. It is vastly easier to specify where Taft will lose the votes he cannot spare than to point out where Roosevelt will gain those he must have.

Analysis of Vote.

Under analysis the vote on temporary chairman shows this:

The Taft people had to put forth all the strength they could muster to win by 18 margin. Last night they gave out positively that they would elect Root with from 70 to 80 majority; their inside office figure, that they themselves expected to get, was 66, or 68 more than enough to elect.

Instead, they got only 15. It was a showing of astounding and unexpected weakness.

On this Root roll call, moreover, they held these votes that they cannot possibly have on the first ballot for President:

Illinois, 7; Oregon, 3; Maryland, 8; New York, 1.

The one in New York represents Woodruff who has declared he will oppose Taft. Taking these nineteen votes away from Taft, he is just one short of enough to nominate.

But this is only counting sure things. In addition, Taft stands to lose probably ten more in New York. That leaves him eleven short of the nominating majority. He will lose one in North Carolina, and five in Pennsylvania. That leaves him seventeen short of the winning total.

Still the possibilities which are almost certainties are not nearly exhausted. Among the Texas delegates who yesterday gave thirty-one votes for Root, are a number who personally prefer Roosevelt's nomination.

Will Not Support Taft.

The President cannot hold these after one ballot, and may not hold all of them that long. In Tennessee there is a situation even more serious for the President. While 23 of the State's 24 votes supported Root yesterday, a number of the delegates are determined that they cannot support Taft for the nomination, because they think it would injure the party's chances in the election this fall to nominate him. He will lose from 6 to 12 of these votes on first ballot according to the best information.

Utah gave an intimation of its real attitude of mind by casting one vote for McGovern for chairman, despite that it is instructed and has been claimed as positively solid for Taft. The truth is that most of the State delegates prefer, personally, that Roosevelt be nominated, and are anxious to break away. The solid eight will stick for the first ballot, but never after that.

Mississippi gave McGovern only four votes, it has five certainly and probably seven in all.

Alabama gave 22 of its 24 votes to Root, but the Taft managers are fearful of several losses there.

Georgia gave the colonel's candidate for chairman six votes; it has more in reserve for him, certainly after the first ballot, and probably on the first.

Finally, aside from some certain and some highly probable losses that Taft must sustain, there is yet to be considered the fact that the credentials committee will do its work tomorrow, of course, and the entire series of credentials contests. The convention will then receive and consider at great length the reports, and will vote on them.

Vote Cannot Survive.

The Roosevelt people are perfectly confident that the steal of Washington's solid vote for Taft will not survive the committee and the convention's action. They have assurances that the steal in Missouri will go the same way, and that the outrageous facts being fully exposed in discussion, the convention, if not the committee, will undo the wrong perpetrated in that case.

That the steal of the Fifth California district will stand, is not feared by the Roosevelt people, or believed by the Taft leaders. There is now, for the first time, a chance to appeal to the moral sense of a great body of delegates, and that appeal will be made in the most effective fashion.

These changes, again, must be augmented by the number of votes that

will drop away from Taft by reason of the strong feeling that his nomination is now impossible. The band wagon never looked so glittering and alluring as at present. The trend has been toward Roosevelt for days; today's test of strength showed that Taft is defeated beyond uncertainty, and the last bond held considerable proportion of his strength was severed.

The credentials business is likely to be most unusual, for the Roosevelt people intend to make this the occasion for the most complete and detailed showing up of the moral turpitude, the political indecency, of what has been done. They will put their strongest fighters on the credentials committee, and there will have the advantage in fighting capacity that they will lack in numbers. The Taft side will have a small preponderance on the committee, but the great Republican States will nearly all be represented by strong fighting progressives, and they will have all the advantage in their hands. On the Taft side the experienced and seasoned fighters are largely dropped out; they have been defeated in their districts or States, and left at home.

Appeal to Judgment.

Following the work in the committee, the great final appeal will be made to the better sense and calmer judgment of the mass of the convention itself. Here the Roosevelt cause will consolidate all its powers. There will be telling speeches, analyzing the more outrageous of the national committee thefts, appeals to the spirit of fairness, and also to the purpose of winning the election, which it will be shown, is possible with Roosevelt, impossible with Taft.

The national committee is now out of the equation. Men like Penrose, Roosevelt, Crane, Lowden, and more of their sort, defeated, left out of the convention, and dropped off the national committee, are henceforward mere spectators so far as concerns the business of the convention. The power that they regarded as so absolute, and that they used so remorselessly, has fallen from their hands.

In Hands of Delegates.

The business of saving the party, of putting it into step with present day sentiment and national purposes, is in the hands of the delegates. True, the convention roll is the one that the Taft committee made, but with all its excesses the committee could not make it strong enough to accomplish the business cut out.

When the roll call on temporary chairman had proceeded a long time, with Root and McGovern running neck and neck, it at last became apparent that Washington State, almost the very bottom of the list, was going to decide the issue.

The election of Mr. Taft's chairman was to be accomplished most appropriately, by stolen delegates. And it proved. Before Washington was called, Root yet lacked enough to win; with it he was put over the line, and the Taft people had won by a majority so close that it amounted in the eyes of all delegates and spectators to a defeat.

CORTELYOU ON HAND TO HELP ROOSEVELT

Former National Chairman Has Secret Conference With Colonel.

CHICAGO, June 19.—The presence of former national chairman, George B. Cortelyou, here is causing considerable wonderment. This morning Mr. Cortelyou had a conference with Colonel Roosevelt. The nature of it was not disclosed, and it was the subject of much mysterious whispering about the corridors.

Mr. Cortelyou makes no concealment of the fact he is a Roosevelt supporter. As former national chairman he has an intimate knowledge of situations in the various State delegations. His visit with Roosevelt this morning led to the belief that he was taking an active hand in the work of getting delegates in line for Roosevelt and drawing them away from Taft.

TAFT AND SHERMAN ELATED AT OUTCOME

Vice President Says Two Splendid Victories Were Won Yesterday.

Vice President Sherman beamed with delight as he emerged from the President's office this morning.

"We won two splendid victories yesterday. One here and the other at Chicago," said he.

Mr. Sherman said the President was elated with the election of Senator Root as temporary chairman of the convention, but would make no statement at this time.

In the opinion of the Vice President the convention will be a lengthy affair; that the platform will be adopted before nomination is made, and that nomination will not be made until Friday or later.
