

NAME JOHN DOLPH TO BE PRESIDENT OF ROTARY CLUB

Washington Business Men Will Affiliate With National Organization.

Washington has a Rotary Club, and there is a noise among business men of the city like unto that of a scramble to get in. The noise is superinduced by rumor now confirmed that only one man in any one line of business is eligible to membership.

John Dolph, the promoter and organizer of the newest thing in business organization in Washington, was named president. Joseph M. Stoddard was elected vice president.

The next step in organization will be to become affiliated with the Rotary clubs of America, which are in more than forty of the principal cities of the United States and Canada.

The keynote of the new organization is stated to be "He profits most who makes the most of his time."

The club membership cannot, by its constitution, be composed of more than one man in any one line of business. The real estate business, the shoe business, the transportation and other businesses may be represented by only one member each.

Under the scheme each member has the privilege of advertising "to the limit" his own business to all the other members of the club, for there can be no objection on the part of other club members not engaged in the same line.

CONTEMPT CHARGES AGAINST HUSBAND ARE NOT PRESSED

Edward T. Crismond Explains Remarks to Wife Suing for Divorce.

Edward T. Crismond, a contractor and builder, defendant in a divorce suit, faced charges of contempt of court before Justice Anderson, in the District Supreme Court, today, as a result of accusations made by his wife, Louise C. Crismond, but on a promise not to molest her in the future he was not punished.

Mrs. Crismond claimed that on July 4 her husband followed her on a train to Chesapeake Beach and greatly humiliated her by pointing her out to passengers with the remark: "There's a woman applying for a divorce, look at her."

It was also set forth in Mrs. Crismond's petition that when she returned home she found that entrance had been forced at her residence and her clothes had been cut to bits.

Crismond denied in his answer that he knew anything about his wife's clothes being cut, and contended that the incident on the train was characterized by "friendliness, and that he did nothing to humiliate his wife."

FISHER TO SETTLE HAWAIIAN FRICTION BY PERSONAL VISIT

Reappointment of Gov. Frear Depends on Conditions on Islands.

Kalaniana'ole charges that Governor Frear is not progressive enough, is out of sympathy with sentiment in the islands, and is too friendly to the Sugar trust interests there.
