

LAST RITES FOR COL. GRACIE TO BE HELD TOMORROW

News of Death Saddens Friends in Capital, Where He Made His Home.

Funeral services for Col. Archibald Gracie, retired, survivor of the Titanic disaster, will be held at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon from Calvary Church, New York, the church in which in 1897 he was wedded to Miss Constance Pillsbury. Burial will be in Woodlawn Cemetery, New York.

Washington friends of the colonel were saddened yesterday by his death, which, while not entirely unexpected, was caused chiefly by the harrowing experiences through which he passed after helping rescue many women from the sinking ship.

Spoke of Great Wreck. In his last illness the colonel frequently spoke incoherently of the wreck, sometimes shouting: "We've got to get them all into the boats. We must get them into the boats."

He predicted his own death only two weeks ago in a speech before the University Club here on "The Truth About the Titanic." At that time he faltered and asked to be excused to rest, explaining that the disaster had broken his health. He told of rescuing women and then sinking into the water where he feared that the boiler explosions would bolt him to death. He was rescued at last, but the great tragedy left an imprint on his mind and health that he could not banish.

It followed him by day and in his dreams at night; then, too, his preparation of a book about the wreck added to the strain on his health.

Only yesterday President Taft received from Colonel Gracie under date of December 2 a letter in which the colonel spoke as though discouraged by the state of his health. Mr. Taft hastened to send a reply in the morning to cheer the ailing man.

Manuscripts Lost. Colonel Gracie was well known in both Washington and New York, dividing his time between the two cities. Here he lived at 1527 Sixteenth street with his only daughter, Miss Edith Gracie, a debutante this season. The colonel descended from Scotch stock, prominent in this country since Revolutionary days.

In New York he conducted a real estate office, but he also found time to do much writing. On his return from England on the Titanic he lost important manuscripts dealing with the war of 1812, and he often declared that he would return to start his work again.


CZAR'S SON MAY BE CRIPPLED FOR LIFE

May Never Regain the Use of His Leg, Russian Doctors Fear.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—The St. Petersburg correspondent of the London Daily Mail telegraphs: The carevitch is still bedridden at Tsarkoe Selo, and a doctor is in continual attendance on the imperial patient. A special apparatus for the support of the left thigh and leg is being made for the carevitch's journey to Gagra, on the Black sea coast, a health trip on which the doctors insist.

It is not yet certain whether the Russian heir will ever recover the use of his left leg. The Casaria refused at first to believe in the gravity of her son's illness until the arrival and verdict of the celebrated specialist, Federoff. His report has, however, convinced her, and she is grief-stricken.

Wetmore Villa Bought by Wardman



WARDMAN BUYER OF BIG COLONIAL SUMMER MANSION

Washingtonian Not to Occupy Wetmore Villa Until Next Season.

Consummation was made today of the purchase by Harry Wardman of "Wetmore Villa," at Allentown, N. J., at a consideration of about \$100,000.

The mansion is one of the most elegant of New Jersey's colony of summer residences, all the woodwork and much of the furniture having been imported. It was built only a few years ago by Mrs. Catherine Wetmore, who has used it as her residence, but who will move to Washington. Mr. and Mrs. Wardman will use the villa as their summer home, continuing their residence here during the winter months. The transaction was made through the office of Shannon & Luchs.

Along Colonial Lines. "Wetmore Villa" is 100 by 50 feet, and is constructed along the colonial plan of architecture. It is built of brick, and contains eighteen rooms and three baths. The property on which the house is situated is 150 by 150 feet, fronts Ocean Parkway, and to the rear of the villa proper is an elegant garage capable of housing five automobiles.

The purchase includes the complete furnishings of the house, which are in strict harmony with the woodwork. The doors and other woodwork are of imported mahogany, and the furniture is of the same material. White enamel trimmings are used, following the colonial plan.

Will Move in Summer. One of the most attractive and artistic rooms in the house is the Japanese room, in which everything, including the floor, was imported from Japan. The woodwork here is Japanese ebony and the furniture is of the same material, hand-carved and inlaid with pearl.

The walls are decorated in the handsomest Japanese silks. The floor is inlaid with Japanese designs that are in keeping with the other fixtures. Mr. Wardman expects to go to Allentown within a few days and take possession of his new home, but will not move his residence there until next summer.

MUSICIAN ADMITS HE HAS A FOURTH WIFE ON HIS LIST

Relatives Shocked When They Find Another Mate in Marital Mesh.

BOSTON, Dec. 5.—Arthur Gordon Weld, former director of music in Milwaukee, has been thrice wedded and divorced and then wedded a fourth time, according to today's latest developments in the tangled marital mesh woven about his life. Relatives and friends in Dedham, Mass., where he filed a bill in equity to establish a trust whereby he could support three wives equally, at first thought the popular musician, wished to support wives number 1 and 2, as well as wife No. 3. The mistake was corrected today by Weld's lawyer, who explained to the astonished relatives that wife No. 3, who was Jane Peyton, an actress, has all the support she needs, according to Weld and that it is wives 1, 2, and 4 whom he wishes equally supported by a court arrangement of his income from a moderate fortune, and his musical engagements.

Another feature of the case developed today when Stephen Weld, a half brother of Gordon Weld, declared the family here knows only that the fourth wife's name is "Claudia" and that she became the fourth Mrs. Arthur Gordon Weld about two years ago. Relatives said Weld's reason for instituting the suit was because a daughter of his first wife had espoused the cause of wife No. 3 against him in a matter of finance. "The whole affair is a matter of spite by my half brother," said Stephen Weld today. "Arthur Gordon Weld has been estranged from our family at Dedham some time and he is taking this opportunity to make it unpleasant for us and for his third wife, who is friendly with us."
