APOPLEXY KILLS SENATOR DAVIS IN SOUTHERN HOME

Picturesque Character of Upper House Dies Suddenly Early Today.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 3.—Funeral arrangements are being planned today for United States Senator Jeff Davis, of this State, whose sudden death here from apoplexy at 1 o'clock this morning has thrown the whole State into mourning.

Senator Davis died before doctors, who had been hurriedly summoned, could do anything to aid him. He was born in Little Rock county, May 6, 1832, and served as district attorney, United States Senator in 1887. He was married in October, 1911, to Miss Lela Carter, of this city. He was the time he was a widower. He is survived by three sons and four daughters by his first wife.

SENATOR OVERMAN SPENDS BIRTHDAY ON HOSPITAL COT

North Carolinian Expected to Leave Institution in Less Than Week.

Senator Lee Overman of North Carolina, celebrated his fifty-ninth birthday today in the George Washington University Hospital where he is recovering from an operation for appendicitis and clamoring for more food than his doctor and nurse will allow him.

Senator Overman began to practice law in his native town and then taking an active part in politics was five times elected to the legislature. In 1888 he became president of the North Carolina Railroad Company after losing the speakership of the State house of representatives by one vote.

Senator Overman nearly got to the Senate here in 1885 but a combination of Republicans and Populists elected Jeter C. Pritchard. His election came afterwards, for the term beginning March 4, 1908. In 1908 he was re-elected, so he has two years more to serve from March 4 of this year.

GOVERNOR PARDONS THIRTY-SIX MORE

Arkansas Executive Takes Last Opportunity Before Term Ends To Free Murderers.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 3.—Gov. George W. Donaghy, who recently almost emptied the State penitentiary by wholesale pardons, spent his last monthly pardon day, examining 166 petitions for pardons, and extended clemency to thirty-six more convicts.

The governor says this about concludes the list of pardons, as he will retire from office before the next pardon day, February 1. Among those pardoned today were murderers, including Tom Johnson, serving ten years; Avera Dougherty, five years; Sam Williams, two years; Elmer Royston, five years; and Andy Patterson, two years.
