The House leaders are "up in the air" over the knotty problem, and an informal conference of Democratic chieftains will be held early this week.

It is generally argued that the sixyear-term resolution adopted by the Senate would increase Wilson's term two years, provided the constitutional amendment were ratified during the first four years of office. Some of the Democrats in the House think the President elect ought to be consulted about a six-year instead of a possible eight-year tenure of office; others believe the en-tire matter should go over until the Democrats have control of the Government, and still others want to know what William J. Bryan thinks of it. Up To Henry's Committee.

The House situation is really up the Committee on Rules, headed by Congressman Henry of Texas, an ardent Bryanite and an original Wilson man. Bryan is committed to a oneterm propaganda, but he hasn't beer consulted on the language of the reso lutions now pending and the proposition to add two years to the tenure of Wil-

Consequently, the Bryan, Clark, Un-derwood, and Wilson Democrats in the derwood, and Wisson Democrats in the House are not sure what they ought to do, and nobody is willing to predict the fate of the Senate resolution, which is substantially the Clayton resolution which has been on the House calendar and waiting for a special rule to make it privileged.

Chairman Henry, of the House committee, was exceedingly close-mouthed tonight, saying that the question is a very serious one and that he would have to consult "with some of the party leaders" before making a prediction as to the probable action of the Rules Committee.
