Federal Government Refuses to Take Cognizance of Change in Mexican Affairs.

Refugees May Return.

It is reported from Vera Cruz that the news of the capture of Madero caused many refugees to cancel their reservations for transportation to the United States.

A situation tense with excitement prevailed in Mexico City yesterday morning, according to dispatches from Ambassador Wilson.

Out of this quiet, broken only by the defiant assertions of the artillery that the rebels still had ample supplies of ammunition, came the coup d'etat in the afternoon when President Madero, long fighting against a rising sea of enemies, was captured by a military general who proclaimed himself President.

Blanquet Will Not Fight.

A report was current at that time that Blanquet's forces had refused to continue the campaign in the events of the day confirmed this and indicated that the orders of General Blanquet were responsible.

A novel measure, designed to permit the importation of needed supplies rather than to raise revenue, was ordered yesterday by the revolutionists, collectors at ports being told to accept a discount of 40 per cent on the regular tariffs imposed on imports.

Turn in Mexican Affairs

Further Involves Situation; Forces Will Rest on Arms

Instead of clearing the air, the arrest of General Huerta as President involved a situation in which the United States must now feel an added interest because of the new dangers added to the situation.

More alert than they have been in the last few busy days, the Department officials awaited further information from Mexico today, with much apprehension.

If the accession of General Huerta should serve to further loosen the already loose control exercised by a central authority over the military, the specter of a civil war, which has been chronicled so far, when all fighting forces were lined up either under Madero or Diaz.

Troops Will Remain.

No battleship will be withdrawn nor will troops be withdrawn from any vantage point as a result of the coup d'etat. It has more elements of danger to Americans and other foreigners than of safety.

The treachery shown in the sudden elevation of General Huerta is taken to indicate, at a distance, that personal ambition is beginning to rule the day in Mexico City in even more pronounced form than when Madero, under the guise of a constitutional election, held the reins.

Pascual Orozco, Salazar, Gomez, and Zapata already have signified that they will oppose General Huerta. If he continues to hold a commission as provisional president, Huerta was until last December in command of the northern division of the Mexican army. He came in contact with the forces of both Orozco and Salazar and they bear memories of their treatment that would naturally incline them to keep up a fight against the newest military dictator.

Gomez has already proclaimed himself provisional president, and with Huerta holding the same place finds himself out of a job.

Zapata is the incorrigible, the Robin Hood of the Mexican revolution in the Mexican situation, his hand against all who have lost that he men may want. Moreover, the Zapatas are in force within

the environs of Mexico City. One of the chief dangers of the present situation has been the arrival of these looting bands in the residential district of the Mexican capital.

Tells of Arrests. The lightning change in the face of Mexican politics was confirmed by dispatches received by the State Department from Ambassador Wilson last night.

At 11 o'clock a message was received stating that President Madero and Gustavo Madero, his brother and a member of the cabinet, had been arrested in the residence of the commandant general of the National Guard and General Huerta.

The selection of Huerta is regarded as unfortunate by many familiar with Mexican affairs, although State Department officials have withheld their opinion.

General Huerta now falls heir to the veiled threat of President Taft's last message to President Madero.

"There must be peace," is the tenor of the Taft demand. The big problem is whether Huerta can capture the dove of peace, which has eluded all of the leaders, actual and presumptive, who have taken a prominent part in Mexican affairs since Porfirio Diaz left the country.

Mexico Passed Over By Senate Committee On Foreign Relations

The Senate Foreign Relations Committee met today, but did not take up the general question of Mexican intervention. Only casual references were made to the developments in Mexico and the bill appropriating \$7,000 to the beginning of next session.

Marines Leave Capital For Guantanamo, Cuba; Transport Begins Trip

At Guantanamo the marines aboard the transport will be engaged in training purposes, but it is understood among the officers and men at Marine Barracks that she will head for Guantanamo.
