

### WOMEN ADVOCATES TO PRESS WILSON

#### Their Resolutions Favor Adoption of Votes for Female Sex Put Up to President.

Resolutions favoring the adoption of an amendment to the United States Constitution and urging President Wilson to recommend for some action by Congress are being received here by the hundreds from woman suffrage organizations all over the country. The resolutions will be presented to President Wilson at the next available opportunity. This is part of the recently organized scheme to bombard the President with suffrage arguments.

### Delegates to Woman Suffrage Convention Not Congressional Appointees

"The delegates to the international woman suffrage convention at Budapest from this country are named by the executive board of the National American Woman Suffrage Association. We here have nothing to do with it and the statement given out by some women here that they were appointed to that convention by us has no foundation in fact."

This is the indignant response of members of the Congressional committee here to the recent allegation that they were claiming the honor of appointing delegates. Miss Alice Paul, chairman of the Congressional committee, is now in New York attending a meeting of the executive board of the National American Woman Suffrage Association.

### BIDS ASKED FOR RIPRAP MATERIAL

#### Government Engineers Call for Proposals to Furnish and Unload Sandbags on River—Appropriation Bills Have Given \$300,000 for Anacostia Project.

WASHINGTON TIMES BUREAU, ANACOSTIA, D. C., MARCH 27. Planning to make an early start on the second project connected with the improvement of the Anacostia flats, which includes that section of the river between Anacostia and Twining coves, the Government engineers have called for proposals for the furnishing and unloading of riprap material on the river. Proposals will be received in the office of Col. W. C. Langfitt, one of the engineer officers designated to serve on the board, having charge of the plans for the reclamation of the flats, until April 22, when they will be opened and the contract will be awarded. No work has been done in this part of the stream, although three successive District appropriation bills contain an appropriation of \$100,000 each for the improvement.

### Commander Blue Directs Bureau of Navigation Commission Upholds Advance in Rates

Commander Victor Blue has assumed the direction of the Bureau of Navigation under the shake-up of Secretary of the Navy Daniels. Early action was taken, following the shake-up orders, to have Commander Blue placed in charge in the position over which Commander Andrews presided.

### Mail Entries Closed For Kennel Club Show

The Washington Kennel Club has closed its mail entries for the annual show to be held April 19, 20, 21, and 22 at the Arcade. The entries have come from all parts of the country, from points as far north as Rhode Island, west as Missouri, and south as Alabama.
